A Journey Within

For most of us, summer is a time when we are more relaxed and more active, all at the same time. Although some people may be busier than usual, others have more time and the opportunity to do the things they want to do, including vacation trips. Whatever your situation, I want to encourage you to take time for a journey within—a regular time for self-reflection, prayer, and contemplation.

Did you know that there is a road that runs straight through your heart? I invite you to make time to walk slowly along that road, stopping to visit with the thoughts and memories that come to you. You know by now that I don't pretend to have all the answers but sharing often helps figure things out.

Some of the tools that may help you in this journey within are the following: choose a quiet place and a time when you are not likely to be interrupted. For me early morning works the best; for others it's just before bedtime.

You may want to read the Bible or some poetry. It's better not to do lots of reading as that may take away the time for reflection. You may want to light a candle or have something special on a table or windowsill nearby such as a flower, a seashell, a religious symbol. Be sure to take some deep breaths and still your mind and body as you begin. Maybe as you journey inward, at some point you will be able to let go and let the Spirit carry you.

CELEBRATING 5 FOR 5

In the United Church of Christ, a 5-for-5 congregation is one that gives to **Our Churches Wider Mission** (OCWM) through its church budget, while also participating in each of the denominations' four special mission offerings received during the year—**One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need, Strengthen the Church, and the Christmas Fund**.

Before I came to Deering, the only offering regularly received was the **One Great Hour Of Sharing.** In 2004 I started the tradition of giving at least a part of our Christmas Eve offering to the **Christmas Fund**, formerly Veterans of the Cross. This fund is to help retired clergy and their spouses who did not receive a high enough salary to have an adequate retirement. Active clergy are also helped when necessary. The Pension Board is in charge of this fund.

One Great Hour of Sharing is the most well known offering and the fund which receives the most contributions. Its purpose is to support partners (such as Church World Service) in more than 70 countries with ministries that fund development projects, feed the victims of famine, provide services for displaced people, and respond to natural disasters. Many different denominations contribute to this fund which is usually received during Lent.

Neighbors in Need supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States and Puerto Rico, including ministry carried out by the Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM) and by the national offices of Justice and Witness Ministries. It is usually received on World Communion Sunday, the first Sunday of October.

The Strengthen our Church offering is used for

new church starts, invigorating existing congregations, as well as developing leadership in adults, youth, lay and pastoral areas. The God is Stillspeaking Ministry is funded from this offering that is usually taken on Pentecost Sunday.

Most of these offerings are divided between our state conference and the national office. For more information on any of these offerings go to www. ucc.org and put the name of the fund in the search box.

By 2007, Deering Community Church was contributing to all four funds as well as giving our budget amount to OCWM.

I am very proud of our church for their faithful generosity. There are only 34 churches out of the 140 in New Hampshire who are 5 for 5. Thank you so much for all you give and all you do.

NONVIOLENCE: Dr. Martin Luther King's Principles

I recently came across a packet of sermons by Rev. Gordon Crouch preached in the fall of 2006 at the Hopkinton United Church of Christ. These sermons are based on Rev. Martin Luther King Jr's six principles of nonviolence. In this newsletter I will list the six principles and add some general comments about nonviolence. In each newsletter, I will address one of these six principles in the Peace Corner.

Most of you know that Rev. King led the Montgomery, Alabama, bus boycott that was initiated when Rosa Parks was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on the bus in December of 1955. King was a new, young pastor in Montgomery. When asked to be the leader of this movement, he insisted on nonviolence—not an easy thing in the face of harassment and assaults by white supremacists as well as law enforcement officials.

In King's 1958 book, <u>Stride Toward Freedom: The Montgomery Story</u>, he outlines the six principles that we will be discussing:

- I. Nonviolence is a Way of Life for Courageous People
- II. Nonviolence Seeks to Win Friendship and Understanding
- III. Nonviolence Seeks to Defeat Injustice, Not People

- IV. Nonviolence Holds that Voluntary Suffering Can Educate and Transform
- V. Nonviolence Chooses Love Instead of Hate
- VI. Nonviolence Believes that the Universe is On the Side of Justice

The bus boycott lasted 381 days. In June of 1956 the Supreme Court declared that segregated seating on buses was unconstitutional and the law went into effect in December of that year. I was in high school and I can remember what an intense interest I had in discrimination and segregation ever since I learned about the killing of Emmett Till, a 14-year-old boy, in the summer of 1955, for whistling at a white woman in a grocery store in Mississippi. The victory of the bus boycott propelled the Civil Rights Movement into the consciousness of the American people with Dr. King as one of the main leaders. King made certain that the nation knew that (in his words) "We have gained a new sense of dignity and destiny. We have discovered a new and powerful weapon—nonviolent resistance." I believe that Jesus taught us in no uncertain terms that we were not to use violence—even with our enemies. Let us listen to his words in Matthew 5:44, "But I say to you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which spitefully use you, and persecute you." (American King James version) In the next issue I will focus on nonviolence as a way of life. I look forward to sharing this series with you.

One year after the Pastor's sabbatical, the committee reckoned with in the world." has reviewed the experience and prepared a required report for the Lilly Endowment, which funded this opportunity. To prepare this report, we reviewed all the activities that took place in the winter and spring of 2009 – the movies, lectures, potlucks, books made available, the map on which the Pastor's journey was charted, the Sunday School curriculum -- that were the result of this unique opportunity. Generally, the experience was viewed as a very positive experience for the congregation.

Remarks in the report reflecting the upbeat reactions include:

"We now understand that India, prior to British colonialism, had been a world power for fifteen centuries, that it has been tolerant of a variety of religious practices, that it has emerged from British colonial dominance economically poor but has grown as an economic and military force to be

"We have a greater understanding of the difficulties that different cultures have mingling with one another."

"I did indeed get a new appreciation of India and how they have progressed by our standards and even exceeded the values of a western world. I have a sense of ancient roots that may be part of my humble self; that the people in this country are indeed brothers and sisters."

"I attended the Sunday School class one day and was transported into the traditions and ceremonies of a distant land."

Nearly two dozen of our members evaluated the experience on a scale of 1 to 10, 10 being the highest. The average score was 8.54, reflecting the positive feelings of the congregation.

Financial Information

Budget Update

When this newsletter arrives, we will be right at the halfway point of our church's fiscal year, so the trustees have been looking at our budget to try to assess how we are doing and how it looks for the remainder of the year.

We accepted a budget in January that included an income category of "To Be Raised", and each parishioner was asked to do whatever he or she could do in the way of extra giving to reduce this number. At this time there has been only one donation to help reduce this deficit. We are

Endowment Fund Minutes

The Subcommittee for the Church's Endowment met on May 16, 2010, to review the performance of our funds over the past year. We are pleased to report that the value of our endowed funds has now rebounded to the level it was before the serious downturn caused by the recent recession. In a comparison study with other charitable funds, the Dow Jones average, and the Standard and Poor's Index, the performance of our funds compares very favorably. This is significant as we live through a volatile period working with stocks and bonds.

Our current portfolio is made up of 52% in stocks,

projecting a reduction in pledge income, which has fallen behind expectations. Also, unless we have an unusually successful fair, we project a small reduction to the fund-raising income. Combined, these reductions increase our "To Be Raised" category to somewhere in the neighborhood of \$9,500.00.

The good news is that our expenses have been less than projected and because of pre-paid pledges, and income from other sources during the summer, we are, at the moment, doing all right. However, we need to look to the fall and winter, so we ask that everyone try to stay current with their pledges and do what they can to reduce the deficit.

40.3% in bonds, and 6.6% in cash. The total value is approximately \$220,000, understanding that this is apt to rise and fall on any given day.

This committee, governed by a set of by-laws, meets twice yearly. In the fall, there will be a meeting with our investment advisor to review our holdings in detail. The results of that meeting will be shared with the congregation at a meeting set up for that purpose – most likely following a Sunday service. The earnings from these funds supports the Church budget according to a formula, designed to preserve the principal, while providing support for the Church's mission.

To All: July 13th Council Meeting - 7 pm- Trustees Presentation & Action proposals

Responding to concerns from the Trustees about the long-range financial outlook for our church, the Council has decided to devote its July 13th meeting to the serious issue of developing a realistic understanding of the Church's financial position. There will be a presentation by the Trustees, a chance for questions, and an effort to develop scenarios or possible actions.

All members of the congregation are invited and urged to attend and participate.

A big thank you to Christine Marcroft who wrote and photographed many of the church events during the past two months for everyone to enjoy in the Newsletter.


