GOD'S GRACE

A few weeks ago during my morning devotions I came upon a passage by Paul Tillich on **grace** taken from his book, <u>The Shaking of the Foundations</u>. It is not a word that I use a lot, and

as I meditated on it I felt called to share some reflections with you.

Grace is used in the Bible in many different ways. I am focusing on grace as a gift from God to human beings, given completely without merit. We are given the gift not because we are worthy or have earned it but simply because God from God's love and goodness wants us to receive it. Wikipedia says that "Grace in Christianity is the free and unmerited favor of God as manifested in the salvation of sinners for their salvation." The New Testament scripture that goes best with this definition comes from Paul's letter to the Ephesians, chapter 2:8-9: "For by **grace** you have been saved through faith: and this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God not the result of works, so that no one may boast." I also like Paul's writing in 1st Corinthians 15:9-11: "But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God which is with me."

Tillich says that we cannot transform our own lives; we must let our lives be transformed by grace. We have no way to force grace, nor does it come to us when we feel we are not in need of it. Grace comes to us when we are in great pain, confusion, anxiety or in a new situation. Let me share an example from my life.

Over twenty years ago I left my job and home, giving away much of my "stuff" and putting the rest

in storage to follow a call to work with the homeless in Washington, DC. In spite of my great excitement. I was anxious about how I would get along in a big city filled with crime and poverty. My very first night there, the back and front windows of my car were smashed. To counter that, God's grace came through the supportive people I was living with in this intentional community. Next was my outreach into this community made up mostly of African Americans. Here I was, a middle aged white woman from suburban California walking the DC streets and parks, yet from day

one my relationship with the individuals in this community was filled with mutual kindness and caring. As I made known my desire to connect with those folks experiencing mental illness, others—many of whom had drug and alcohol addictions—reached out to me and connected me with those I was seeking. There's no way I could have had such a meaningful and helpful experience without God's grace. I felt so strongly the Spirit moving with me.

Another way grace comes is when we are not doing well emotionally, spiritually or physically; when despair and hopelessness sets in; when we feel deeply the separation of ourselves from the Divine and from earthly contacts. Paul Tillich says,

"Sometimes at that moment a wave of light breaks into our darkness, and it is as though a voice were saying: 'You are accepted. *You are* accepted, accepted by that which is greater than you... Do not try to do anything now; perhaps later you will do much. Do not seek for anything; do not perform anything; do not intend anything. *Simply accept the fact that you are* accepted!' If that happens to us, we experience grace."

Many of you have heard me talk about my long dark night of the soul. When I returned from my amazing year in DC, I simply could not find a church, a community, or any solace through what had been such a strong faith. Without taking the space to share more details now, I had a sudden burst of light and actual physical feeling of being touched by God. I felt that was definitely God's grace. One of the scriptures that connect to this experience is from Romans 11:6 "But if it is by grace, it is no longer on the basis of works; otherwise grace would no longer be grace." I did nothing to suddenly have this spiritual experience that resulted in restoring my faith and a decision to go to seminary.

In closing, I pray that all of you will be open to God's grace; and when it comes, let it wash over you, transform you, and cause you to say with me: Praise God and thank you Jesus!

NH Peace Action

In this issue I want to share with you about NH Peace Action and some the information on their website. This organization exists for the purpose of making a contribution to world peace. "We envision a world in which nuclear disarmament, mutual security, global understanding, international cooperation and respect for human rights create social, economic, and environmental benefits for all humanity."

Currently their focus is on advocacy and education in the areas of calling for an end to the US occupation of Afghanistan; diplomacy with Iran; reducing the Pentagon Budget; and nuclear disarmament and nonproliferation.

If you are interested in becoming a member you may sign up online at http://nhpeaceaction.org/donate/. Individual memberships are \$30 with limited income members paying only \$10. Please consider joining/donating and supporting the good work that they do. The website lists many topics such as signing up for the newsletter, articles of interest, and one I especially liked was "Ongoing vigils" listing the place and purpose of regular vigils. One of the articles was on the Global Peace Index (GPI) for 2013. The GPI ranks 162 nations using 22 qualitative and quantitative indicators that gauge three broad themes: the level of safety and security

in society; the extent of domestic or international conflict; and the degree of militarization. Unfortunately over the last 6 years the world has experienced a decline in peacefulness—much of which is related to the intensity of internal conflicts within a country. Europe is the most peaceful region with 13 countries ranking in the top 20—the top three being Iceland, Denmark and New Zealand. Afghanistan is at the bottom, followed by Somalia and Syria.

I encourage you to go to http://www.visionofhumanity. org/#/page/our-gpi-findings to find out more, including a video presentation. In closing I would like to mention one more thing—the economic result of all this violence. The total cost of containing this violence is equal to 11% of global GDP or in US dollars: \$9.46 trillion. If this figure were cut only by 50% it would "repay the debt of the developing world, provide enough money for the European stability mechanism, and fund the additional amount required to fund the Millennium Development Goals." These figures are astonishing and shameful. My prayer is that each of us can start the peace and non-violence ball rolling, one by one, little by little till we see great progress in the Global Peace Index. Shalom, Peace, Salaam.




