Lenten Journey

How are all of you doing in your Lenten Journey? By the time you read this newsletter you will probably be approaching your third Sunday in Lent. The scheduling of my time

away this winter prevented me from preparing you for Lent as I like to do; however, I believe it's better late than never. Easter comes on the last Sunday in March this year, the 31st, so there is still time to journey onward.

For Roman Catholics, especially in the olden days, Lent was all about sacrifice—fasting and abstinence. It was a somber time. Even today in many Christian circles, the question that is asked is what are you giving up for Lent? How many of you have given up chocolate or desserts in general during Lent? I certainly have, thinking how this would be a good start to a diet.

In my opinion, Lent is a time to become more attentive to God and our spiritual life. I have written in other years about adding spiritual disciplines—keeping the sabbath, more devotional reading, and prayer. The word Lent itself is related to the English word lengthen, used because in the northern part of the world the days lengthen as we get deeper into our spiritual attentiveness. Lent is a time that we can focus on finding our true self as we journey with God to Resurrection and New Life. As we become more open to God, we can let go of selfdeceptions and reflect on who and whose we really are. During this time it is important to look at our sorrows, our fears, our grief, our mistakes and, yes, our sins. Important on the journey is self-discovery, connecting with and helping others, doing "good works" and ultimately a feeling of inner joy.

I believe that one of the best ways to practice this openness to God is through contemplative prayer, a simple, wordless, trusting opening of our self to the divine Presence. So often we use prayer to talk to God: contemplative prayer is listening to God. The method that I am most familiar with is Centering Prayer, developed by Thomas Keating and Basil Pennington. When I lived in Washington, DC, I took a class on Centering Prayer with Pennington. He insisted on practicing 20 minutes twice a day to start.

Centering Prayer is really very easy. The hardest part is convincing yourself to engage in this spiritual discipline. One sits on a chair or mat and allows one's heart to



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open to that invisible yet always present Creator of all. When thoughts come to you, as they surely will, just let them go and return to your intention of listening to God. You choose a short word or phrase, sometimes called your sacred word, and utter whenever thoughts come. You then go back to your intention of being open before God

It's natural to feel disappointment when your mind is just flooded with thoughts. There is a well known story told by Father Keating about a nun who after her first attempt at Centering Prayer complained, "I

am such a failure at this prayer. In twenty minutes, I've had ten thousand thoughts." Father Keating responded without skipping a beat, "How lovely! Ten thousand opportunities to return to God!" Keating also said that the only thing you can do wrong in this prayer is to get up and walk out. (From Bourgeault, *Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening*)

Bourgeault says," But in the depths of your being, in fact, plenty has been going on, and things are quietly but firmly being rearranged." I have often heard that the way to notice that there is something positive going on is to look at what happens after sitting for a while in Centering Prayer: refreshment

and the ability to be more present, being able to be more flexible with those around you as well as feeling more peaceful and comfortable within your self.

If you would like to read more about Centering Prayer, I recommend the following books: *Open Mind, Open Heart* by Keating; *Centering Prayer* by Pennington, and *Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening* by Cynthia Bourgeault. If some of you would like a group to learn and practice Centering Prayer, let me know. I'm also happy to help you individually. May your Lent be Holy and may God bless you.

He is a Jesuit Priest, Peace Activist, Organizer, Lecturer, and Retreat Leader. Father John is the author/editor of 28 books on peace and nonviolence, including Living Peace. Maundy Thursday Worship

Maundy Thursday is Pastor Barbara's favorite service of the church year. Many of those that attend regularly would agree; yet so very few people attend. This year the service will be on March 28th at 7 pm. Please plan to be with us as we prepare for Easter.

This service includes several ancient Maundy Thursday traditions. Maundy is the English form of the Latin word meaning commandment and refers to Jesus' giving a new commandment to "love one another even as I have loved you."

We meet in Sherwood Hall, and there are three major parts of this worship: foot-washing, Holy Communion and Tennebrae, the Extinguishing of the Lights. Tennebrae, a Latin word that means

"darkness" or "shadows" is the process of candles being gradually extinguished until only the Christ candle is left. The Christ Candle will be extinguished at the end to symbolize the apparent victory of the powers of darkness at Jesus' death. The relighting of the Christ Candle foreshadows the Resurrection. At this point the service is over and we ask that all leave in a meditative silence when ready.

As always your participation in the different parts of the service is optional. There is a brief reflection by Pastor Barbara, hymns, and music from the choir. The readings are portions of Jesus' passion. If you wish to be a reader please let Deacon Jim Carpenter know. Most of all, be sure you give yourself this opportunity to get ready for Easter.

Mission 4/I Earth

At the NHCUCC's annual meeting there was an announcement about a new environmental mission program for our denomination, starting on April 1, 2013. "Mission 4/1 Earth links together four significant events — Easter (March 31), Earth Day (April 22), Arbor Day (April 26) and Pentecost (May 19) — for a sustained, aggressive and collective mission opportunity for the entire United Church of Christ. Together, we will inspire and aspire to what we can accomplish as ONE CHURCH." (from UCC.org)

We welcome new women from Deering, Weare, Hillsboro and surrounding towns to come and join our convivial little group for fun and friendship each month. Dues are only \$5.00 a year. The Sunday School and many members of the congregation participated in the pageant on December 23, 2012. Lauren wrote the script of this biblically based pageant as well as creating the set and directing the actors and actresses. It was truly an intergenerational event!

On February 3, 2013, the young women of the Sunday School presented the congregation with some difficult information.
Ruthie, Mackenzie and Hailey decided that for the Souper Bowl of Caring collection they wanted to raise money for women's

empowerment. They learned that in the developing world, women are responsible for producing 80% of the food yet own less than one percent of the land.

Mackenzie explained how much progress has been made with women's rights in the United States. Hailey spoke about a 10-year-old girl from Yemen who had been forced to marry against her will and become a wife in all that entailed at her young age. Ruthie offered several updates on current Heifer International projects that have resulted in great improvements for women. The Women's Empowerment project through Heifer International provides women with support, education, and training so women can become self-sufficient and lift themselves and their families out of hunger and poverty. After church they collected about \$350 that will go to Heifer International for the Women's Empowerment project.

Work In Progress

Those who have been around the church lately have seen that there is much that has been accomplished. We have been enjoying the new windows and those who choose to sit near them are finding that they are much better at keeping the cold air out where it belongs. The screens for the windows are at the church and will be installed in the spring after some painting of the



sills and outside casings. The half round window at the peak in the front of the church has been removed and will be rebuilt and reinstalled in a few weeks. We have beautiful new doors that were painted before they went up and are so very easy to operate. The last of the weather stripping went on just before the big storm. Our thanks go to Bill Bartlett for leading a crew that included volunteers Tom Cavanaugh, Tom Burke, and Budd Bartlett. Installing those doors took a lot of care and some very long days. After all that, we still have just under \$7,000.00 in the Capital Campaign Fund, so when weather permits work will continue on some of our other projects.

Reminder from the Financial Secretary

In January, the congregation voted to accept what is essentially a deficit budget with a 'to-be-raised' line of \$2,255.00. By accepting this budget, we were also accepting the responsibility of meeting this obligation by various means- an extra donation occasionally in addition to pledged amounts, perhaps a new fund-raising effort, maybe even 'tithing' a portion of your income tax refund. If everyone remembered to give a bit extra every month, we would be well on the way to achieving this. This will be the third year we have had this 'to-be-raised' (TBR) line in our budget, and last year there was only one contribution of \$5.00 toward reducing this deficit. I am hoping this was at least partly due to lack of awareness on the part of most, so more reminders will be coming this year. *IMPORTANT:* When you make a donation designated for the TBR line, please be sure to *clearly label* it as such so I can assign it to the right budget line. With a little bit of help from everyone I'm sure this can be done.

Help the Hillsboro District Food Pantry

It is here again - that time of the year when the Hillsboro District Food Pantry participates in the **Feinstein Challenge**. For the past thirteen years, a man named Allen Shawn Feinstein has given away \$1 million dollars of his own money to anti-hunger agencies throughout the country.
