### **Moderator's Desk**

As I write this, I find myself still smiling from having seen the Christmas Pageant held this morning. It was a wonderful performance and service. All who participated in its preparation and performance are to be commended for their hard work. And Lauren Warner can't be thanked enough for all she has done this year. Of course she has taken on the special task of writing, then directing the church Christmas Pageant for many years. We are fortunate indeed to have her keeping this holiday tradition alive and vibrant in our church.

By the time you read this, we will have celebrated our Christmas Eve service. I'm not able to be there this year for this service, but no doubt the celebration with Lessons and Carols on Christmas Eve will be meaningful and beautiful. I sincerely hope your Christmas holiday was warm and wonderful.

I was delighted to announce a couple weeks ago that the Interim Search committee had completed their work, and that they were able to successfully find an interim minister for us. Recall that their semi-formal deadline was actually next March, but they were trying hard to find a suitable candidate to start on January 1. With the makeup of the committee, it's no wonder they were able to meet this more aggressive target. At the Church Council meeting on December 10, the committee recommended Reverend Leonard Zecchini to the Deering Community Church as its interim minister. Jim Carpenter gave a detailed and glowing report on Rev. Zecchini, and after much thoughtful discussion, the Council unanimously agreed to accept the search committee's recommendation. The Council was fortunate to meet with Rev. Zecchini later that evening, and we were able to chat and get to know him a bit better. I believe I can safely speak for all the Council members when I say that he is a warm and friendly person, and I'm certain that he will be a wonderful and positive presence in our church and community.

Pastor Zecchini, or 'Leonard' – he considers either a suitable way to address him - is from Lyndeborough, and has a wealth of experience. He has specialized in interim ministry work, having served as an interim in many churches over the course of twenty or more

years. He is also currently serving as chaplain at St. Joseph's hospital in Nashua, and it is expected that he will continue to hold that position through his time with us. The first Sunday of 2014 will be our first Sunday with Reverend Zecchini. I hope you are all able to come and welcome him.

### **Interim Minister Selected**

#### Stuart & Suzanne Huggard

On Tuesday, December 10, the Church Council unanimously voted to accept the recommendation of the Interim Minister Search Committee to call Rev. Leonard Zecchini as our Interim Minister. Rev. Zecchini will begin his ministry with us on the first Sunday of 2014, January 5.

Rev. Zecchini, (prefers to be called Leonard, or Pastor Leonard) will be a half-time pastor, and will acquaint us with his schedule once he is settled. While recognizing the limitations of a half-time position, he has made it clear that he intends to function fully as our pastor, and will be available to the congregation 24/7 as needs might arise. In our several meetings with Rev. Zecchini, we have been impressed with his experience, his kind, caring ways and his intention to meet our needs as a congregation, as well as to guide us through this interim period as we search for a settled pastor.

There is much in his background and experience that qualifies Rev. Zecchini to be our interim pastor. Below find Leonard's bio as provided by him. We look forward to getting to know him better.

The Rev. Leonard Zecchini grew up in Andover, Massachusetts. He attended the University of Maine and UMass-Lowell, studying engineering and business administration. Following university he worked for the US Navy in Kittery, Maine, supporting the construction of nuclear submarines at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. He then attended Andover Newton Theological School and was ordained in the Evangelical and Reformed tradition of the United Church of Christ, and served as a parish minister in western Pennsylvania where he met his wife-to-be, Ruth Smyres. He was both a counsellor and a chaplain in addictions rehabilitation for thirteen years. During the past twenty-one years he has served as Interim Pastor of seven parishes in New Hampshire and Massachusetts, most recently in Boscawen. For the past seventeen years he has also served as a staff chaplain in St Joseph's Hospital, Nashua founded by the Grey Nuns of Montréal. He and his wife Ruth, who is a Master Weaver, live in Lyndeborough, NH.

## **Pastor Barbara's Farewell**

It seemed like an impossible task, but fellowship hall was set up to accommodate 70 to 80 sit-down diners who came to salute retiring Pastor Barbara Currie on Oct. 27, 2013. The Huggards had presented a festive scene with rainbow-like place settings and tablecloths. Debbie arrived with a bouquet of purple/lavender balloons and Angela Bell's flower arrangements graced each table. There are potlucks and then there was this potluck: Soup, roast pork, rosemary chicken, lentil salads, a magnificent trifle and apple pie (only a few listed). Moderator, Peter Cram, introduced the evenings speakers with a moving message of his own about Pastor Barbara's outstanding leadership these past ten years. He introduced Rev. Joyce Lovejoy and Rev. Bill Salt, past ministers in Deering, among the guests that night. Jeanne Bartlett spoke about how she has become a "look-a-like" for Barbara and how she hopes to become her "be-a-like" as well; she thought that many have been encouraged to be a more loving, forgiving people. Moderator emeritus, Steve Waters, recited the church's mission statement: Compassionate, Open to All, where Christ's Teaching leads to Spiritual Growth and Action and told everyone how Barbara has led members in that direction. Jane Waters, music director, expressed her pleasure in working with Barbara to present meaningful worship. Deacon, Jim Carpenter, recognized her leadership toward significant outreach and a deepening of prayerful life. The deacons gave her a beautiful, embroidered

pillow and scarf as well as a gift of money. Guild president, Betty Dishong, presented her with a gift of a hand woven shawl in some of Barbara's favorite colors, as suggested by members of the Guild, and spoke about Barbara's compassionate visits among her parishioners. Trustee, Stuart Huggard, had had a poster of the church in an autumn setting elegantly framed and completed with signatures of church members on the glass which came from the old church windows. (This picture is still available for those who have not yet added their signatures.) A very generous check was presented to Pastor Barbara, the sum of which included the gifts of many community friends as well as church members, many of whom were there that night adding to the applause. The Sunday School had made a beautiful, tie dve scarf to give to her. The Ministerium was well represented, also, with pastors from St. Mary's, Smith Memorial and United Methodist Church of Hillsborough in attendance. One pastor spoke about the sunrise Easter service he had shared with Pastor Barbara. A very touching closing to the evening came when Jocelyn Luckett, Barbara's daughter, stood to tell everyone how much the church and community has enriched her mother's life's work and how proud she was of her mom. That is when many people in the room, perhaps, felt the pain of loss along with the sincere, well wishes they had for Pastor Barbara's happy retirement.

## **Guild Gleanings**

A Guild meeting was held on November 6th. (Due to the holidays, there was no meeting scheduled in December.) Following a luncheon at the Deering town hall sponsored by the Greater Hillsboro Senior Center, a Guild business meeting was held at 1 pm back in the Deering Church fellowship hall. In lieu of a nominating committee, the group asked the present officers if they would continue to serve in their current positions for 2014. They agreed to that and the officers for 2014 are Betty Dishong, President; Kay Daniels Vice President; Jeanne Bartlett, Secretary; and Hazel Vogelien, Treasurer. The Treasurer's report was accepted. A budget committee was formed to meet and come up with a proposed Guild budget for 2014 which will be presented for review and approval at the January 8th meeting. Jeanne collected information updates for the 2014 membership booklet which Barbara has prepared and printed for distribution. The booklet will be mailed to those not at the January meeting.

Ideas for the Summer Fair were discussed. It was voted to have gift baskets for sale again. Members were urged to think about new ideas and suggest a craft item or a fresh approach to fair offerings. Betty asked members to bring some handiwork like knitting, crocheting or some other craft to the January 8th meeting. Joyce Peace was asked to bring up at the December Council meeting the summer fair problem we face with the loss of a quilt

to raffle, and ask Council members to come up with some new ideas to raise that money. She was to ask the Council for a church representative to co-chair the Summer Fair. Barbara produced a new Guild poster to advertise for new members in two sizes for distribution in welcome baskets and posting elsewhere

Since the first Wednesday of January is New Year's Day, it was decided that the Guild meeting would be held on January 8th at noon instead in the parish hall. The February meeting is on Wednesday, the 5th, at noon in the parish hall. All meetings are subject to weather permitting. The new hotline at the back of the membership booklet will be used to inform members of any changes in the schedules.

**Note:** Stuart spoke to Debbie Carpenter about making a quilt for the church fair. She is offering to make two quilts—one big and one smaller. The church would pay her \$600 to make these. The Council unanimously voted to accept this offer at their December meeting.
