Interim Pastor Leonard's Pen

This year Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5. There have been requests for a Lenten program, possibly following worship on Sundays, so that still another probable week-night activity won't be added to our busy

lives. I am checking into the possibility of a videodiscussion program. When I was younger and the practice of religion was a greater influence (perhaps) in the life and standards of our communities, I heard a lot about "giving things up for Lent". I don't much hear that these days, and I am not particularly advocating giving things up for Lent. There might be good reason to give something up, but why just because it is Lent! Do it anyway, any time, if there is good reason to do so.

The original Lent, or at least what we commemorate with our Lent, was Jesus' sojourn in the wilderness for forty days. This story in the Bible (Matthew 4:1-11; Mark 1:12–13; Luke 4:1–13) is essentially that of a young man coming of age, breaking away from his family and his community and going out into the wilderness of the world and being tempted by all that there is out there, struggling to find his own identity, his own standards and values, how he is going to live his own life. It is obvious from the biblical text that Jesus' struggles with the Devil. Satan, the Tempter, did not consume every minute of those forty days. Jesus was out there away from the hustle and bustle of everyday life to talk to God, and what is more important, to listen to God.

We hear much in our lives but I question just how much we listen. We live in a very noisy world and quite frankly I tune out much of it. I hear but I don't listen. Rather than Giving Up For Lent, how about if we all Added For Lent, intentionally adding some time in our already busy schedules to be a part in whatever our own personal wilderness might be, to listen to God, and if that is a bit too intimidating, to

listen to whatever it is that we hear. It might be just quietness. That certainly would be a significant addition in my own life! It might be listening to that "still, small voice of calm" (John Greenleaf Whittier).

As part of your quiet time | April Services, W S & O with Jesus I would hope that you also talk to him — share your deepest concerns, desires, frustrations, angers (even angers at Jesus, if you have any). The God of Christianity is not a wrathful god out to get us. One story that shows what kind of relationship might be helpful for us to have with God and Jesus is this. "A friend was traveling in Spain.

- 4. 4) Committee reports reviewed
 - a) Jim also thanked Debbie Matthews for her service and reminded people about the benefits of attending *Prepare to Serve*. He reminded people that the search committee for the settled pastor will require dedication and time and those that are asked to serve or offer to serve should take this into consideration.
 - b) David mentioned the importance of the projects completed on workdays.
 - c) Jeanne mentioned how generous our church is with supporting **5 for 5**, (UCC churches that give to Basic Support and all four Special Mission Offerings) and any requests to address needs are promptly filled.
 - d) Jeanne spoke to how the Women's Guild

- f) Chris spoke about several special events this year in C.E. – caroling, confirmation – thank you Bryan, Peter and Pastor Barbara for their time in planning confirmation.

- h) Thanks were offered to Priscilla for her work with the archives

We discussed what could be done in the fund raising area and will bring this up at the church council in their Feb meeting.

We also made a list of tasks to accomplish at the next Saturday work day.

At the Trustee meeting on January 15th, we discussed the projects for the next Saturday workdays and chose some to concentrate on. At the February 1st workday, we looked at all the faucets to replace or repair those that needed it. Quilt #2 is called "Nine-patch and Rails". Simple blocks are set

on point and set off by feather-quilted borders. It is a large couch throw, approximately 58" by 75" in rose, green and cream, made with 100% cotton fabric and batting.

There will be one raffle ticket sold for both quilts. The first person drawn will choose one of them and the second person drawn will receive the remaining quilt.

It is here again - that time of the year when the Hillsboro District Food Pantry participates in the Feinstein Challenge. For the past 14 years, a man named Allen Shawn Feinstein has given away \$1 million dollars of his own money to anti-hunger agencies throughout the country. During the months of March 2014 and April 2014, all monies raised and items donated to the Hillsboro District Food Pantry (each given a value of \$1 per can or pound) will result in the receipt of a proportionate share of the Feinstein \$1 Million Dollar
