And it won't make you cry.


Some say that time is money;

Ruth and I met him when we were living in Keene. Dr Johnson's book Finding God in the Questions: a Personal *Journey*, was published in 2004. Here is a quotation from the dust jacket.



Pastor Search Committee

Thank you for getting those surveys completed and sent in!

Another round of thanks to those who attended the "Pastor Search Question and Answer Forum" held after church, on May 17. The Pastor Search Committee (PSC) wanted to review the search process, and let everyone know where we were in that process. After a brief summary of some of the questions and comments from the surveys, there was an opportunity for discussion.

The search process in the United Church of Christ in New Hampshire is directed by the state Conference office. It is a rather long process carefully planned and designed to provide the best possible result in matching a congregation seeking a Pastor with a Pastor seeking a position. Each preliminary step needs to be completed before we can move on to actually receiving profiles for review and consideration. The PSC has been meeting regularly each Monday night to work on the Profile and other search process components. We are nearing completion of the Church Profile, and are beginning to examine types of brochures and ad postings from other churches in the Pastor Search process, to help us with these tasks. The committee is also charged with presenting a "Call Agreement" for prospective Ministers, with salary and other compensations, as well as expected Ministerial responsibilities. This

should also include the Pastor's days/hours as part of the package. All this information needs to be gathered and prepared to present to possible candidates in the best way possible. We want to make us look as good as we know we are!

The forum approached some of the above items. There was discussion about how the church has changed over the years, what direction the church is heading, what were priorities and expectations, as well as what the congregation might be able to afford to pay the new Pastor. While there were no formal determinations, it provided a time for all of us to think about the future of the Deering Community Church. We (PSC) appreciated the lively and sincere discussion which demonstrated your commitment to this church.
