Following the format provided by the New Hampshire Conference, our Search Committee has been meeting weekly throughout the Spring and Summer seasons, with occasional breaks for vacation and refreshment. The results, as of this writing in early August, are a completed Parish Profile, a Brochure, and an Advertisement. These documents will be submitted to Pastor Zecchini Moderator Cram and the Church Council, for proof reading and suggested editing. Once their approval of these documents has been

received, they will be forwarded to our advisor, Conference Minister Shulte, for the next step in our search which will be advertising for the position.

In working together, the Search Team has learned a more complete, thoroughgoing understanding of our parish, both its history, its transitions over time, and the work undertaken in current times. Along with this is a realistic picture of what our church may be able to accomplish, there is pride in the slogan "Small But Mighty", in reviewing all the activities in which we have been engaged. Yet we keep a vision of better serving our membership and our community.

Margaret Colburn of Weare, NH died peacefully on Monday, July 13, 2015 on her 107th birthday, having been born on that date in 1908 in Brattleborough, Vermont. She grew up on the family farm in Bernardston, MA. She graduated from the Powers Institute, the town's

high school, and went on to the Keene Normal School graduating in 1927. She found employment as a school teacher at age 19 in Deering, NH at the North Deering School, a one room schoolhouse which no longer stands. She has one pupil left who remained a friend over the years, Hazel Vogelien, who was in her first and second grades. She taught for two years and then had to leave teaching when she married Chester Colburn. She moved into his home in Weare just over the Deering line. She worked alongside of him in his poultry business while building Colburn Cottages on Lake Horace. They were married for 67 years with Chester dying

in 1995, and had three children, Shirley, Chester and Marjorie. By the time Margaret died she had children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and many friends.

She was a member of the Deering Community Church and Woman's Guild from 1927 until her death. Her interests included golf, gardening, knitting and family. She was active in the church and the Guild activities and projects like the annual fair for many years. She was such a gentle, soft spoken lady and will be missed by so many of us who knew and cherished her.
