Pastor's Pen



"We believe in [belove] one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

"We believe in [belove] one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God. For our sake he was crucified

under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures....

"We believe in [belove] one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen."

Above I have quoted in part from The Nicene Creed, one of the classic statements of faith of orthodox (traditional) Christianity. It dates from about the year A.D. 381 as a testament to the then current concerns and understandings of the Christian Community. I do not know if the reading of this creed during worship has been part of worship in the Deering Community Church in the past; we have not used it during this time I have been with you as Interim Pastor. It is a primary statement of faith used by many Christian traditions.

I have also placed in brackets [] the word "belove". The original Greek text of the Creed used the word *pisteuo*, which means "to trust" or "to faith". There is no verb in English that means "to faith". The translators came up with the word "believe" which in the context of the Creed did not

mean to have ideas or opinions about something. *Pisteuo* meant "to belove", to be devoted to something or someone. What would happen in worship if we changed a few letters in the word "believe" — how might that change what happens in worship?

Without demanding that anyone use a creed or statement of faith as a "litmus test" to determine the acceptability or authenticity of anyone's faith, I sometimes wonder whether we, the Church, actually consider what those earlier Christians were trying to convey. Do we really believe in [belove] "...all that is, seen and unseen." Do we really believe

[belove] that Jesus "rose again in accordance with the Scriptures..."? Do we really look "for the resurrection" and [belove] that the sort of power that enabled a small, scared, confused group of Jesus' disciples to do an about-face, insisting that Jesus was not destroyed, and rapidly growing in numbers and influence throughout the Roman Empire, that this power can be available to us today, bringing to us and our world new life, new hope, new possibilities?

Or do we believe only in what we perceive in our own experience, or what can be explained in scientifically replicable situations or tests?

Pastor's Pen Cont.

The Church throughout history has accepted such things and acting in trust that God, as revealed in Jesus Christ, is the same today as yesterday and will be forever. Today we still sing in a song of praise to God, the Gloria Patri, "...as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be...." Living out this faith, trust in God, the Church acted with great resurrection power and her accomplishments turned the world upside-down.

Shall we, like them, step out in faith this Easter with the resurrection power of God supporting us in God's endeavors?

This is what Easter and the Resurrection is about. Jesus was not resuscitated, given back his former life. He was resurrected to a new and different life. Before he was available only to those in the Holy Land two thousand years ago. Now he is available to all people, everywhere. We have been made heirs to that awe-some power with which the Creator brought the whole cosmos into being. The Body of Christ, the Christian Church, (and that means Deering Community Church as a local manifestation of Body of Christ in our lives), is a conduit, the place where that power is made available to ourselves and our neighborhood.

Are we able to respond to Jesus' call to us to live out this Kingdom-life of Easter faith, and be resurrected to a new and different life?

Annual Meeting Minutes

The Deering Community Church Annual Meeting was held on January 24th in Sherwood Hall after the church service. Present: Pastor Zecchini, Steve Waters, Jane Waters, Stuart Huggard, Suzanne Huggard, Bryan Terry, Peter Cram, Christine Marcroft, Lee Marcroft, Jeanne Bartlett, Jean Lewis, Ruth Zecchini, Sam Kelly, David Bell, Bob Fuller, Peg Hauschildt, Chris Nase, Jane Levesque, Priscilla Beaudrault, Betty Dishong, Joyce Peace, Kay Daniels (See church website www.deeringcommunitychurch. org for entire annual report booklet with all reports.)

- 1) Peter opened with a prayer. He offered thanks to all those contributing to the annual report and meeting. He made note of the dedication of the report to Suzanne and Stuart and the *In Memoriam* to Margaret Colburn.
- 2) Pastor Leonard spoke about his anticipated departure before the next annual meeting, as a new minister will hopefully be called by then. He expressed his enjoyment of his time here.
- 3) Peter spoke about his job as moderator, leading council and concern about lagging attendance.
- 4) Peter asked us to look at the Annual report from last year. Steve moved to accept the minutes from last year, Bryan seconded the motion, and the motion was unanimously approved.
- 5) The clerk's report was reviewed.
- 6) Bryan spoke about the work of the Search Committee. She updated us on the current status. There are several candidates interested in the church. The committee has been meeting faithfully and is very dedicated.
- 7) Steve explained the method used by the Endowment Committee to decide on funds to be used.
- 8) Christian Education was discussed. No children attended Sunday School this past year. It will be offered if children begin to attend. Jeanne B. asked about Adult education and would like to be involved in providing more opportunities.
- 9) Sam acknowledged the hard work his predecessor Jim C. did and how challenging it has been for him to "get it right".
- 10) The Trustees have worked very hard this year on the bathroom and kitchen. Jean mentioned how impressed she was with all the members hard work. She encouraged all to continue to attend

workdays. One correction to the Trustees report was noted – Ray Petty bought one stove and David Bell purchased the other stove.

- 11) Joyce reported that the food pantry has been very successful and the contributions from our church are valuable. Peter wondered if we could get more information about how many people are served by the Weare food pantry.
- 12) Peter expressed thanks for all the work the Glauners do for our Newsletter and Website.
- 13) Betty reviewed the Guild report.
- 14) Jane reviewed the Music Committee report. She mentioned several opportunities to sing with the community and the success of those endeavors. Jane recognized the long time contribution of Stuart to the choir.
- 15) Jeanne reviewed the World Service and Outreach report.
- 16) Priscilla expressed thanks for all the help she has received in maintaining the archives.
- 17) Peter asked for a motion to accept the annual reports as modified. Steve made the motion, Bryan seconded the motion, and it was passed unanimously.
- 18) Suzanne mentioned a change in the financial report the miscellaneous line should not have any specifics after it. She commented on how close we came to matching our pledges in actual income.
- 19) Stuart reviewed the 2015 budget. Lawn work and custodial service was added during the year as needs of the church dictated. He reviewed the 2016 proposed budget with the proposed \$40,000 salary for an incoming Pastor. This budget has a \$7,997.50 deficit "to be raised". There is still furniture Bob has made to sell, as well as a few other larger ticket items that could be sold. Someone would need to help with marketing these items. On the Account Balances sheet, there is a mistake the endowment fund line is incorrect, refer to Angela's number from her report. The information below the Total Current Assets line is incorrect. Peter noted

- that the income and expenses are very close indicates good money management and faithful pledging commitments. Steve made a motion to accept the financial and budget reports as modified, Jeanne seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved.
- 20) The Nominating report was reviewed. Bryan offered to be on Christian Education to help with adult education. Peter will need someone to take his position as moderator, as his term is up at the end of this year. Peter is willing to take on Stuart's job as Treasurer (a replacement is needed by April 1) if someone becomes moderator earlier. Pasca will take on the Financial Secretary position. An additional delegate to the NH conference is needed. Jean asked for additional help on the Trustees. Steve motioned to accept the Nominating Committee report, Bryan seconded it and it was unanimously accepted. Pastor Leonard installed those members on boards and committees.
- 21) New Business: Steve reminded members about *Prepared to Serve* on February 20, 2016 and encouraged all to attend.
- 22) Peter asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Steve moved the motion and David seconded it, it was unanimously approved.

<u>March 6</u> is dedication Sunday when the annual appeal for One Great Hour of Sharing will welcome your gifts. Here are some frequently asked questions re OGHS donations:

What is One Great Hour of Sharing?

One Great Hour of Sharing is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, emergency relief and rehabilitation

What percentage of OGHS donations are used directly for mission?

On average, of every dollar given to One Great Hour of Sharing, 92 cents is used directly for mission programming. Most administrative costs are paid by gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission National Basic support.

Where and how are OGHS funds shared?

The United Church of Christ responds to development, disaster, and refugee needs in 138 countries, and provides disaster relief and immigration assistance in the United States. UCC responds as a member of organizations such as Church World Service and the ACT Alliance. Nearly

one-third of the UCC's offering is shared through Church World Service to support refugee, disaster, development, and advocacy programs.

How can I contribute to One Great Hour of Sharing?

This offering is received through local UCC congregations and all UCC members are encouraged to participate in this way. You may also make a secure on-line contribution by visiting our One Great Hour Sharing website at www.ucc.org/oghs, and click on the "Donate" button.

The Guild held their regular meeting on January 6, but the February 3rd meeting was canceled since Jeanne Bartlett and Joyce Peace were both having different surgeries at the end of January so would not be attending a February meeting. Winter finally showed up with very cold weather and snow in February.



Nancy Mooney, a long time member of the Guild while she lived in Deering, died on a Saturday. Nancy was born on June 30, 1924 and passed away on Saturday, December 5th, 2015 at age 91. She was a resident of

the Edgewood Retirement Community in North Andover at the time of her death. She was a 1941 graduate of Lynn English High School and a 1979 graduate of Drew University with a BA degree. Nancy and her husband Richard had been residents of the Town of Deering after their retirement from the work force, volunteering their time in activities of the town and the Deering Community Church. Nancy worked on many of the lovely handmade quilts that were raffled off at the church fair in the summers and she was a member of the Women's Guild. In 2000 they moved to the retirement community in North Andover where they spent the rest of their lives. Dick died in December, 2014 and Nancy passed away in December, 2015. At Nancy's request, there was no memorial service.

A regular Guild meeting was held in January with lunch, coffee and cake. The business meeting covered all the usual department reports that were available. The Guild voted to offer \$100 for a matching gift challenge to collect \$8000 which would then be matched by others, sponsored by the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce, for a donation to the Hillsboro Food Pantry. This is in place of the Feinstein challenge of past years. The money will be given if there are enough pledges from others to match this amount. Jeanne wrote the Guild annual report for the church booklet. Barbara Glauner produced 20 membership booklets with a hotline update, which Jeanne passed out to Guild members. The January meeting ended with discussions about ideas for the Summer Fair to be held on August 13, 2016.

The next scheduled meetings will be March 2 and April 6. We look forward to seeing everyone there along with any new women from the communities who would like to come and make new friends.

Moderator's Desk

The harsh comic anecdote about a funeral goes something like this —The memorial service of a powerful and disliked movie mogul was surprisingly well attended. One ambivalent mourner asked another to explain the existence of the large crowd of attendees. The acerbic response was, 'Give the public what they want, and they'll come.'

A lot of our discussions these days are focused on how we might attract new people to the church. We aren't unique. Most mainstream churches these days are facing similar dilemmas as that which we're seeing. At the same time, we hear that some of our more evangelical brothers and sisters are not seeing these problems with their congregations. Not true. From what I'm hearing it's an issue across the board.

I was recently told of a book written on this subject by the president of the United Church of Christ, John Dorhauer. The title of the book is 'Beyond Resistance – The institutional Church Meets the Postmodern World'. I picked up a copy, and while I haven't finished the book yet, I'm finding it a fascinating read. He addresses the issue head on, right from the first page. He doesn't shy away from stating that many of our churches are dying, and he clearly says that perhaps some of them should go. He attributes the decline in interest in today's church to several factors, including a declining birthrate, the ever increasing costs associated with maintaining historic buildings when that money could be better spent on mission work, and the tendency of the 'millennials' to shy away from the notion of universal truths. He's a huge believer in 'mission' as being the one thing that we can collectively believe in and focus our attention towards. The book gives us great food for thought, and my guess is that as a congregation, we may be taking a closer look at more of what Dorhauer has to say in the months and years to come.

So one of the questions we might consider is, how in the long run do we keep our doors open? We have a lot to offer, and as we all know, we continue to offer it! We work hard at doing our part in the community to feed the hungry, clothe the poor and heal the sick. Don't we? Sure we do. Perhaps there's more we can and should do. I can't help but feel that others in the community want to join us in doing exactly that too. We need to somehow let them know what we're doing. To come around to the initial thought, If we offer it and it's really what people want, they'll come.

We've talked about more advertising, though the great snippets that Jeanne put in the paper regarding our Shrove Pancake luncheon didn't seem to bring us more attendees. Perhaps a better sign out front that is updated frequently with the events we're holding would help. We can always use more events that are not just work, but fun! We've tried some of these things in the past, and they've been successful. We need to keep after it.

We all appreciate each other so very much, in all that we do, individually and in our groups. Let's continue to talk about this most important issue. I can imagine that the new ministerial leadership we expect to be seeing within the next several months will have a lot to say as well. We look forward to that coming our way. It will be interesting to see thoughts and ideas, and what we consider the right thing to do to meet our challenges.

One thing is for certain, the life and lifeblood of the Deering Community Church is always changing. Our members are ever willing to stand up and take on what needs to get done. As we evolve through to the next ministry, I hope we will continue to stick together and focus on not only the needs of those in the community as a whole, but what it takes for us to hold ourselves together as a church community.
