chose me to enter into as
covenantal arrangement
as Interim Pastor

beginning January 1, 2014 for the period until the parish chose and called a settled pastor to minister with you.

The Pastoral Search Committee the congregation chose in 2014 has completed their task. With their recommendation and your election you have extended a Call to the Rev. William Beardslee to be your pastor. The terms under which I came have been completed and Ruth and I will be finishing our time with you.

Leaving this church community will be difficult for Ruth and me as most departures are. You who have become dear friends may find our departure difficult too. Some of you have expressed with genuine feeling sorrow to see us leave and wished we could have stayed on.

While it could be convenient to have an interim pastor for a time "on trial," that places a Pastoral Search Committee in a potentially difficult situation. This could give an interim pastor unfair advantage over other candidates. There might be personal loyalties toward or prejudices against the Interim Pastor as a candidate that could cloud a Search Committee's objectivity in their task of finding the best possible pastor for a congregation.

My covenant with the church specified that I would not allow my name to be put forward as a candidate for the position nor would the church consider me for that position. With this parameter in place, I

could function as your pastoral consultant completely free to be and to respond to you and your situations, as I deemed appropriate at the time without consideration whether my actions would have any bearing on my being acceptable as a pastoral candidate in the future.

I shall cease to have a professional relationship with the people of **Deering Community** Church at the end of my sojourn with you. Bill begins ministering with you the first of July. As I will have one week of accrued vacation time. my last Sunday with you will be June 19th. Some of you might be tempted to seek me out in time of pastoral need because you know me and are comfortable with me.

However, if that occurs you will find that I will be referring you back to Bill, your new pastor. It is to him that you will be looking for pastoral services.

While my firm stand in this matter will not prevent Ruth and me from occasionally participating, as appropriate, in social affairs with individuals or the parish in general, I will not function in any pastoral role with you without an express invitation from your pastor. This might seem an arbitrarily hard position to take, but I will do this in support of your new pastor and your developing relationship with him.

Sometime in September, we will all celebrate as the church participates with the New Hampshire Conference of the United Church of Christ in holding an "Installation Ceremony" for our new Pastor. For those of you who have not had the opportunity to meet Bill, or would like to be refreshed, please read the following letter, so eloquently written by Steve Waters, on behalf of the Pastor Search Committee:

March 3, 2016

Dear Members of Deering Church and Friends:

It is with joy and conviction that the Search Committee presents the Reverend William Frederick Beardslee as our candidate for Settled Pastor. Our search has been long and thoroughgoing as a number of candidates expressed interest in becoming our pastor and submitted their credentials for our review. It was Bill's spiritual and educational background, broad experience, personality, and keen interest in Deering which made our decision unanimous and most enthusiastic.

Bill earned his Bachelor's Degree with a combined major in Psychology, Religion, and Literature. At Andover Newton Theological School he received a Master's Degree, which was followed with postgraduate work in Depth Psychology and Family Systems. In his career as a pastor, Bill served most recently for 11 years as Pastor to a UCC church in Jaffrey. He has established his own counseling service in Keene and served for many years as Associate Director of Student Involvement and Spiritual Life at Franklin Pierce University. Bill now wants to return to being a Pastor. The part time position here enables him to continue with his wellestablished counseling practice in Keene, where he lives with his wife, Lisa Mahar, a lifelong educator and for the past 25 years the lead Administrator at Monadnock Waldorf School in Keene. Bill and Lisa have three grown children, Amber Fields and husband Alvin, of Keene. They are parents to five children between them. Amber is a current student in Business Accounting. Luke and partner Jennifer are parents to Braeden living in Medford, MA. Luke is an executive Chef at Lucky's Lounge in the South End and Jennifer is a school psychologist in Wakefield, MA. Some of you may remember Bill and Lisa's youngest son Silas, who was very close friends with Balance Chibangwa and his family. Silas lived in Rimbi, Zimabawe until he was deported. He now resides in Jarna, Sweden as a codirector of the Youth Initiative Program (www.vip. se) YIP is a holistic education program in Järna, Sweden that gives youth 18-28 a chance to explore their fullest potential and take initiative towards a better world

In addition to his broad experience, the Committee was especially impressed by descriptions of Bill as a "pastoral counselor", where he is seen as one who cares deeply and listens to people. In reading what others wrote about him, we find these phrases: "stunningly effective with young people", "able to get inside difficult situations, ask the questions that matter, and before long get to the difficult core of issues", "an inspiring listener", "able to relate to individuals from the widest range of ethnic religious and economic backgrounds". Of his prayers, one wrote: reflect a "deep sense of spirituality, articulate and intellectually stimulating ...no fluff, just good content". Bill writes about himself: "I cultivate an open mind, eyes and heart that allow me to walk and stand with others. It allows me to facilitate relatively effective communication and an ability to assist others in their journey toward awareness of and engagement with God, self and others..." And finally: "I try to pray, retreat, read, relate, hope and laugh." The Committee's initial interview with Bill was more like a discussion, less like a job interview, and we wished for more time together with him. When we gathered to hear him preach and conduct a Sunday service, our enthusiasm was heightened. And Bill expressed an equal enthusiasm to become our Pastor and collaborate with us all to work out a role for Deering Church in the years ahead.

You will have chances to meet and get to know Bill at a 'Meet and Greet' tea time on Saturday, April 2nd at 2 PM in Sherwood Hall and then to hear him conduct our worship service and preach here on Candidate Sunday, April 3rd. A vote is taken following the service, to determine whether or not the congregation chooses to issue the "Call" for Bill to be the new Pastor for the Deering Community Church.

Search Committee members will be pleased to answer questions you may have and to share our delight in the prospect that Bill Beardslee may be joining us as our Pastor this summer.
















Financial Report

Quilt Raffle for Summer Fair





Hillsboro Food Pantry Challenge

The Hillsboro District Food Pantry has been in operation since 1989 and includes the towns of Hillsboro, Deering, Washington and Windsor. Washington started its own food pantry within the last year. Up until 2006 the pantry was in different locations in Hillsboro and had added a clothing closet as well after a few years. A new building was constructed on Church Street with the generosity of people and contractors in the area communities. The food pantry is on the first floor and the clothing closet is on the upper floor.

The pantry took part in the Feinstein Challenge for a few years until that ended recently. This year the pantry had it's own challenge of \$8000 to be raised with monetary donations as well as food donations to count toward the total. By mid-April the \$8000 was reached and it still continues on thanks to the generosity of area communities.

Winthrop Colton Bartlett (Bud) 1925– 2016

Winthrop Colton Bartlett (Bud) of Deering, NH, died on March 21, 2016, after a short illness. His wife, Jeanne Titcomb Bartlett; his daughters, Jane Millon, Susan Bartlett, Holly Weinberg, Abigail Bartlett; and his son, William Bartlett, had the great privilege of caring for Bud at his own home with help and compassionate guidance from the Concord Regional Visiting Nurses Hospice services. His twelve grandchildren, seven great grandchildren, many nieces and nephews, friends, and neighbors had an opportunity to visit him and hear the stories he had to tell about the adventures of his long life.

Bud was born in Lowell, MA., on Aug. 12, 1925. His four siblings, the late Ruth Herman, Neil Bartlett, David Bartlett and Eleanor Huang, remember their big brother's interest in being on the water, rowing up the mighty Merrimack river in a patched up Amesbury skiff, playing hockey on its ice and joining the swim team at Lowell schools where he also played trombone in its marching band. He joined the Navy, of course, but found himself in the air as flight engineer for the Naval Air Force during WWII. He was a graduate of Wentworth Institute of Technology, class of 1949. He lived and worked in Lowell before moving with his growing family to Deering in 1962. He was one of the early founders of North Branch Builders, Inc. He later became self-employed and a fine builder/renovator of many houses, barns and structures throughout NH. Bud found time to sail the chartered waters from Penobscot Bay, to Florida and the Bahamas, often with family as crew. He was a patient teacher on the sea as well as on land and at home with his kids and wife, the place he loved to be above all. His children, as apprentices, remember him as the fixer-of-all-things and through his influence became self-reliant adults. Bud and Jeanne celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary last year, reveling in their fine fortune, good health and a loving family.

A memorial for Bud will be held at the Deering Community Church, where Bud was a member, on June 25th at 2 pm. A reception will follow. All are welcome.
