## **Pastor's Corner**



Dear Deering Community Church, UCC and Friends,

I pray you all had a blessed Christmas and now greet the new year with great anticipation and deepest hope. There is no doubt we are in for a ride we cannot imagine. The church engages in study,

worship, prayer and action to bring the music of Love to our aching world and God's moaning creation as the Apostle Paul referred to it. That music is revealed in the life and teachings of Jesus. The birth of the child comes to us every day even as we close out our Advent and Christmas celebrations. Next, we move into Epiphany, the revealing of Christ-Love to the Gentiles beginning with the story of the Magi's (or Wise Men) visit to the Child and his family.

Subsequently, Jesus birth begets a time of trial for his family as they flee and go into hiding as refugees to Egypt after they learn of mad Herod's plot to slaughter all children under two years old. Herod considers the birth of the "new born King" to be a threat to his throne and power. This is just how corrupt, fraudulent and fearful power acts in the world. Jesus will deal with this reality throughout his whole sojourn with us until we enter the Season of Lent, at the end of which he is executed as a common criminal and rebel.

Howard Washington Thurman (November 18, 1899 – April 10, 1981) was an influential African-American author, philosopher, theologian, educator, and civil rights leader. His poem on the back page was turned into a hymn contained in the

New Century Hymnal. Thurman was an activist and mystic. He served as dean of Rankin Chapel at Howard University from 1932 to 1944 and as dean of Marsh Chapel at Boston University from 1953 to 1965. In 1944, he cofounded, along with Alfred Fisk, the first major interracial, interdenominational church in the United States. Thurman's theology and practice of radical nonviolence influenced and shaped a generation of civil rights activists. He was a significant mentor in many of their lives. Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. cites Thurman as one of his most profound teachers and mentors from his time at the BU

School of Theology. (Adapted from https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Howard\_Thurman.) Thurman's books are too numerous to name, his insights and inspirations boundless. He comes highly recommended, particularly in this historical moment. This is especially true on the heels of Advent-Christmas as a time of great expectation and hope for each of us personally as well as for the world. I hope Advent-Christmas gave you a deep sense of the glory and

hope of being alive and committed to a better world. Thurman said, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." The world needs people AWAKE and ALIVE! We heard that theme over and over again.

Our time is fraught with all manner of threats and complications diminishing our possibilities, not only for justice and peace, but even the planet's survival. Yet as persons of faith we move forward with an attitude that is open and full of the possibilities that God holds out for us. We

Thurman said, "The movement of the Spirit of God in the hearts of men and women often calls them to act against the spirit of their times or causes them to anticipate a spirit which is yet in the making. In a moment of dedication, they are given wisdom and courage to dare a deed that challenges and to kindle a hope that inspires." ## **Moderator's Desk**

Dear Friends.

It's hard to believe that the end of another year is fast approaching. Perhaps by the time you read this, we will have already celebrated the New Year. With my Moderator hat on, I tend to think of the business at hand, and in particular, the upcoming Annual Meeting. This year, it will be held after church on January 22<sup>nd</sup>. I always find this to be an exciting occasion, when we can look back on the things we've accomplished, and set targets for the upcoming year. It's a time for some analysis as well, as we look over budgets and our financial standing, to see how we've been able to manage with the income we've brought in, and how well we've used those resources to best meet the needs of the church and our wider community. So far, the Stewardship Committee is telling us that our projected income is down somewhat from what it was last year. In preparation for the meeting, we will be having a discussion period after church on January 8<sup>th</sup>. At that time, some ideas about a potential church restructuring will be presented. Many of us have been challenged by our inability to meet the committee obligations as dictated by our bylaws. We need to face the fact that given our current membership, some of our bylaws are impractical. We should face this dilemma, and make some positive adjustments where necessary. We think the timing of this discussion period is good in that it will give people time to think about these changes prior to the annual meeting, when more formal motions on the reorganization will be offered.

The annual meeting also marks the transition from one team of boards and officers to another. This year marks the end of my second term as Moderator, so it is a time when I will be moving out of that position, making way for my successor. The

Nominating Committee is still working on filling that particular position, but there are possibilities in the making. Looking back over the past four years, I am heartened by the support I have received from everyone. We have done a lot together, and I have certainly learned a lot. Perhaps the one thing I've come to appreciate more than ever is how well everyone in the Deering Church works together, despite the challenges.
