From the Pastor's Pen



I am mindful of all the recent efforts to affirm grounded science in contrast to the extremism of "alternative facts" and imperial religious speculation. It's certainly an interesting discussion. But just what is science? Just what is religion? According to the

dictionary science is "the intellectual and practical activity encompassing the systematic study of the structure and behavior of the physical and natural world through observation and experiment." Some of science grew out of the general inquiry of theology, as "reasoning or discussion concerning the Deity, the science of things Divine." Jews, Christians, and Muslims of the Abrahamic faiths, as well as other world religions, have delved deeply into discerning the presence of the divine in all of creation. Out of these inquiries came many branches of the sciences. Somewhere along the line this parallel inquiry divided into opposing camps largely due to extreme fundamentalism on both sides. They are both inquiries into the nature of cosmic and physical reality. Spiritual and scientific insight each have something to offer those in the world who do not go the extremes. Quantum and Particle physics, for instance, are unfolding mysteries scientists of vesteryear could not even begin to speculate about. The very nature of reality is being discovered anew.

It's important to understand science and theology as two related fields of study into the nature of reality and its function. Each requires what in philosophy is referred to as the "hermeneutics of suspicion," defined by Paul Ricoeur. G.D. Robinson states that it is "the fine line between a call for objectivity

(grounded in some way in the text or object of study), and yet at the same time seeking to remain "open" to what the text may have to say. Ricoeur's hermeneutic of suspicion represents his attempt to retain both science and art, whilst disallowing either an absolute status; (Ricoeur says) "Hermeneutics seems to me to be animated by this double motivation: willingness to suspect, willingness to listen; vow of rigor, vow of obedience." http:// www.gongfa.com/ robinsonlike.htm It is the suspicion, openness and objectivity, that allows

serious exploration and communication between faith and science. Biblical criticism arose from such inquiries and has continued to illuminate our understanding of the nature of the divine reality and texts. Together they help us approach a relative and functional grasp of a moral universe of both chaos and order. Human consciousness is one of the most profound gifts of existence. While it separates us from other life forms we begin to discover through scientific inquiry that there are varied types of consciousness in other living organisms. Ours is of an advanced willful nature and the most dangerous as so proven by our species very short history.

Our task as practitioners of Christ-Love is to serve ALL of creation. Resurrection teaches us of the regenerative nature of life, so needed to rescue our planet and all species who have become victims of our pride, selfishness and materialism leaving a wake of desolation and destruction in its wake. The humans must wake up with new eyes to know what lies unseen, what interpenetrates the physical, bodily reality of which we are a part.

Geo-Logian (as he liked to be called) Jesuit, Fr. Thomas Berry wrote a book called Dream of the Earth, that brought him to the attention of many. He therein articulated the call for a "a mutuallyenhancing human-Earth presence" among the humans. Influenced by Berry and others, a "think tank" came up with "The Ten Key Values" for transforming the human presence on the planet. These Ten Values, as well as Berry's other work, are the cutting edge and synchronization of culture: spirituality/faith/arts, politics, economics and survival embodied in workable strategies. Within each area, a series of questions is asked for reflection. They are: Ecological Wisdom, Grassroots Democracy, Personal and Social Responsibility, Nonviolence, Decentralization, Community-based Economics, Past Patriarchal Values, Respect for Diversity, Global Responsibility, and Future Focus.

Treasurer's Report





We can be comfortable, yet not over confident with our financial status. Through prudent spending and watching of the bottom line, we find ourselves for the most part in line

with budgetary expectations. Having completed 25% of the fiscal year, we've spent roughly 28% of the yearly budget. This, despite having made significant payments toward heating oil since the first of January. We expect that outlays with that particular line item to be relatively minor for the remainder of the year. Many thanks to all who have helped to make the finances of our church remain steady.

We're pleased to see that a significant contribution from an anonymous donor for \$7,500 came in.

Meanwhile, our church continues to show incredible generosity toward the 5 major fundraising programs sponsored by the wider church. To date, contributions to 'One Great Hour of Sharing' totaled \$1,347. I don't recall us ever having raised that much for this program. Amazing!

Last month we also paid \$1,000 (half) of our commitment to the conference for 'Our Church's Wider Mission, so we're ahead of the game with respect to our overall outreach contributions.

Clearly, in terms of the funding we provide and the work we put behind our words, we continue to live up to being 'small but mighty'.

New Day Steve Waters



In May of last year, a group of parishioners met with the Rev. Paul Nickerson in a workshop at the Conference Center. Jammed into a crowd of representatives from other parishes, all had the same thing on their minds. Can our beloved church actually survive in this time of uncertainty? Is there hope for us

to be relevant and thriving while our congregation has diminished to a precious few? Paul Nickerson gave us hope with specific pathways to vibrant effectiveness while telling us directly that churches can no longer expect people to show up at their door, that churches must become known in the community by getting out from the walls of the church, talk to people about who we are and what we do, and then invite and bring them to the church. We were promised that the work would be long and difficult but essential in order to survive in a continually fast changing world.

Our group – Rev. Bill Beardslee, Lee and Christine Marcroft, Chris Nase, Bryan Terry, Jane and Steve Waters, soon joined by Carol and Jack Hubert – began meetings at various cafes to present a visible presence in the community while charting a course of action to reintroduce the Deering Community Church to the community at large based on the Nickerson formulas.

Being more intentional about what we are known for already, our group came to an awareness about the difficulties confronting "reaching out" in Deering, a town with no central gathering place along with various infrastructure frustrations. We

took actions to overcome the inherent difficulties that have confronted us, including use of the media to publicize our activities, meet and greet dinners, events to meet and thank police and firemen, and other opportunities for the community to come to know us.

Clearly, the calling and installation of Rev. Bill has been the one key step the church has taken this year. Factors that have been important include an engaging and meaningful church service; adding new choir members, an enhanced sense of community and relationships; and great involvement in inspirational and informative after-church discussions and forums. Coming together as a committee to recognize and address our problems has led to renewed optimism and confidence in our future.

The bottom line – attracting new people – is the proof in the pudding, if you will. On Easter Sunday, seven new parishioners were installed as members of the church! These newcomers bring with them new ideas, new backgrounds, and new energy for our church.

While important to celebrate the accomplishments and successes of the past year, it remains that we both recognize the efforts and also the work that still needs to be addressed. The top priority is to include all members of the church in the positivity, enthusiasm, and collaboration in the need to grow. As the church culture of loving, welcoming and helpful outreach is fully absorbed, we may find a greater sense of a vital future for the Deering Community Church.

Here is a list of things we can do to decrease our carbon footprint – 1) Turn off lights when you leave the room; 2) Unplug items not in use; 3) Lower thermostat - move more, use blankets, sweaters, layers; 4) Limit use of materials (reduce), reuse any materials possible, recycle when no longer usable; 5) Share a list of tools, machines, equipment you own and would be willing to loan - especially items that have limited use - share rather than purchase; 6) Turn off water when washing dishes, brushing teeth, use rainwater containers, use "warm up" water for watering plants; 7) Think before you print - can you use a digital copy, can you copy on both sides, what is the purpose of printing?; 8) Purchase "clean" electricity - Amanda Gunter does this; 9) Combine errands, walk when possible, share errands with a friend; 10) Use less, buy less, buy from local vendors.

What else are you doing to be a good steward of our earth?
