Pastor's Corner



After the rains the leaves fall away. I hear mumbling on the sidelines, "It's coming. Winter is coming." It is anticipated and not necessarily with excitement. Yet, this is New England abounding with its seasons. They are fluid, not with abrupt beginnings and endings, but

through magnificent processes of metamorphosis. There is transformation, mostly imperceptible, from cool to cold to freezing, warm to hot, wet to dry, with all kinds of variations in between. The seasons of our lives are not much different. They abound with change after change, some welcomed, others not, some expected, some not. "If you don't like the weather in New England now," said Twain, "just wait a few minutes," is as much a saying for our lives as it is for the weather. The only difference is we can fight our lives more than we can the weather

The Fall-Winter-Advent Christmas Season comes just at the right time to fend off the denying, rationalizing, suppressing, ignorance, complacency and indifference to change and decay. The earth seems to strip down, retreat inward upon itself. The juices that once flowed freely into life giving sap are drawn in and down to prepare for a later re-birth. Earth hibernates as do many animals. Then there is a kind of dying that takes place. It's as though the earth takes a big in-breath to hold together all that has returned and does not exhale until the inklings of Spring in its roots and soil, when there slowly arises new juices allowing the earth to exhale and begin its next cycles into Spring and Summer. We begin to look for the crocus, the tulip and other

signs of the new life itching to be born.

These processes are not dissimilar to our own inward processes if we intentionally and consciously enter into our souls through prayer, play, study, meditation, and conversation. We prepare ourselves for the infusion of new life in Advent Everything is anticipation from Advent to Easter. We learn of the stories surrounding the birth of Jesus. We then learn of some of his teachings and life until we enter Lent as if to be reminded that we are still in the tomb of earth, the tomb of our souls, the tomb of life, without full awareness. Yet Spring and Resurrection coincide. But that's for later.

ECUMENICAL THANKSGIVING SERVICE

Please join the churches of Hillsborough-Deering for our annual Thanksgiving Service. This year it will be held at the United Methodist Church on Main St. in Hillsborough on Nov 19 at 7:00 pm. Our combined choirs will be there. A time of fellowship follows.

NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

November is traditionally known as Native American Heritage Month. All over the country, in Indigenous and non-indigenous communities, the legacy and contribution of Native Peoples is celebrated. It is also a time to acknowledge the legacy of genocide inflicted on the 500 nations who lived on this land when it was invaded by immigrants.

On Indigenous Peoples Day, formerly known as Columbus Day, I invited the congregation to step forward in the future to express our solidarity with Indigenous People and their nations by repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery and planting a Burning Bush over its ashes.

November 26th we will enact this significant and meaningful recognition.

The Doctrine of Discovery originated with "Pope Alexander VI on May 4, 1493, (and) played a central role in the Spanish conquest of the New World...The Bull stated that any land not inhabited by Christians was available to be "discovered," claimed, and exploited by Christian rulers and declared that "the Catholic faith and the Christian religion be exalted and be everywhere increased and spread, that the health of souls be cared for and that barbarous nations

be overthrown and brought to the faith itself." This "Doctrine of Discovery" became the basis of all European claims in the Americas as well as the foundation for the United States' western expansion. In the US Supreme Court in the 1823 case Johnson v. McIntosh, Chief Justice John Marshall's opinion in the unanimous decision held "that the principle of discovery gave European nations an absolute right to New World lands." In essence, American Indians had only a right of occupancy, which could be abolished." https:// www.gilderlehrman.org/history-by-era/imperialrivalries/resources/doctrine-discovery-1493. We'll accumulate experience and be able to judge whether this will work or not. It's a model that relies on everyone's participation as they are willing and able. We'll go with it to the end of the year 2018 unless it very obvious it won't work.

Moderator's Report

I have fallen in love with the daily meditations from the "Center for Action and Contemplation", founded by Father Richard Rohr, as introduced to me by Pastor Bill Beardslee... a little background: Drawing from his own Franciscan heritage and other wisdom traditions, Richard Rohr reframes neglected or misunderstood teachings to reveal the foundations of contemplative Christianity and the universe itself: God as loving relationship. I'd like to share a recent CAC meditation. According to the anonymous author of *The Cloud*: Loving is the deepest kind of knowing that transcends the usual "operating system" which sees from differentiation and separation (you from me, or them from us). Only surrendering humbly to this path of love will result in the discovery that God is not the **object** of our longing and love, but is the **loving** itself...God is the force that is binding, moving, sustaining, and transforming us with every breath and every evolutionary shift on our planet. Our world today, could use a little more "loving". It's time we threw out the old 'operating system'... no more 'us and

them'. We have certainly felt evolutionary shifts in numerous ways. We've been exposed to Nature's tempest of hurricanes, droughts, fires, and earthquakes. We've witnessed increasing war-torn nations that are crushing and wreaking havoc on God's people and all of God's Creation with no where for refugees to go and more immigrants being rejected in our own land. Indeed, our Country is struggling to find her own identity. A great political, ethical, and ideological division has reared its ugly head throughout our land. We really do need to transcend the usual way we think, feel and act. We and the world need more 'loving'. There is no real separation between all of God's Creation and ourselves. Even within the walls of the Deering Community Church, we, as individuals, are as one. There is a great need for intentional love and support in this world, in our communities, our State and Country, the Middle East, Zimbabwe, even the environment. Where can we be most helpful? What is it that our church has a passion to do? The folks at the Deering Community Church have a big heart. As

a group we exude warmth, kindness, and generosity. We are 'Open and Affirming', for *everyone*. We have a sister church in Zimbabwe, and between the Women's Guild and choir members, we have adopted 2 children. We help 'Feed the Teens' and provide food to local pantries.

Besides needing to choose where and how to extend our hand of love and support, we are in the midst of 'restructuring', and 'reconciling' who we are as a church, and where and how we choose to grow. We have several new members, and their spiritual and physical needs and thoughts ought to be respected and nurtured. Our congregation is still smaller than it has been in years, so we need to 're-configure' how to best operate and/or function at this point. How can we do the work, or ministries, that are most meaningful to each of us, and that we have the manpower and energy to carry out? Faithful and hard-working groups of people in this church, have continued with church up-keep and ministries that we have held dear over the years. I want to thank all of you who have provided the love and labor that have kept us going. As we work closely together, these next few months, to figure out where our paths lead us, please hold our church in your prayers. The ministry areas that we will endeavor to make functional and fruitful, will need everyone's imagination, trust, cooperation, love, and participation.

Reverend Bill Beardslee will be shedding more light on the "Restructuring" process and ramifications. The old Articles and By-Laws were not working for us. You will note a "New Model" chart in this Newsletter. We hope to broaden the means of communication. We should all ask questions and share our thoughts as we begin to embrace the new structural model. Most importantly, please actively participate and become engaged in the needs and doings of the church, in the ways that are most meaningful to you! Together, we need to let the Holy Spirit work through us as we smooth out the loose ends! We have always risen to a challenge in this church. I'm sure we will do so again with intention, action, focus and faith. Other groups/committees, or 'Ministry Areas'', as we will begin to call them, will provide more information on their various activities elsewhere in this Newsletter, where you will see that this church continues to be incredibly active! Please note their dedication and good works.

The Stewardship campaign, which should really be yearround, began in earnest in October. The on-going maintenance of this old building is costly! We need to finish painting the outside... only 3 more sides, thanks to the dedication and hard work of Peter, Tim, Peg, Byron, Jean and others under the whip of your Moderator! Thanks to all for your generous contributions to the Neighbors In Need mission held on October 2. A total of \$316.75 was collected. The focus, this year, was: **In a Just World, Clean Water is Life. Protect the Sacred!** (Two-thirds of your donations support advocacy, programming and grants.)

The offering received at the Christmas Eve service will be dedicated to: **The Christmas Fund** which provides direct financial assistance to retired and active United Church of Christ authorized ministers and lay employees and their surviving spouses, including pension and health premium supplementation, emergency assistance, and Christmas thank-you checks. A ministry of the Pension Boards, the offering is received annually on the Sunday before Christmas.

Several Welcome Baskets have been assembled and are ready to be delivered to new residents in the community.

We much appreciate the snack donations along with funds to keep 24 bags filled with small meals, drinks and snacks, for monthly delivery to the Teen drop-in Center in Hillsborough. Thanks to Joyce Peace for making that delivery!

We welcome your messages of hope written on the paper snowflakes provided by high school students and others for delivery to the Women's Prison at Christmas time. Last year's count was 180 and we hope for your participation again this year. Join the coffee hour folders, cutters and message writers after church in December!

Guild Gleanings

In looking back at the Summer Fair in August, the Fair made about \$3,277.27 after all expenses, sharing the profits half and half between the Deering Church and the Guild. There were discussions at subsequent Guild meetings about what to raffle off in 2018, since the 2017 raffle did not make as much money as usual. Perhaps offering quilts is not as popular as in the past. We are asking people to think about this for suggestions as to what we might do for a raffle.

The Guild thrift shop has been open every last Saturday of each month since it was started in mid-2017 and is doing very well with new donations from people in the church and around town monthly. The profits are split half and half with the Deering Church each month. For example, in August we earned \$108 with half going to the church. The Guild will sponsor a children's Christmas Shopping day again this year in the thrift shop where children can shop for gifts for their parents and have them gift wrapped while Mom or Dad have cookies and coffee upstairs. The tentative date for that is Saturday, November 25th while the

Two letters home

September 18, 2017 and October 10, 2017: Hello from Järna Sweden, It is crazy to think that it has been almost a month since I set off for Sweden and embarked on my YIP adventure! During my first few days I got to know the campus (which is gorgeous), my new home (my room has a view of a field where I see sheep grazing each morning) and my fellow yippies (who are all super nice). For the first week we got introduced to the curriculum and toured the extensive campus. The second week we jumped into the program and learned about gentrification and discussed urban place making. The third week we helped harvesting at a local farm, went to a ecologic bank and had two days of art of hosting. This coming week we are learning about politics from Gerald Häfner. I also decided after a lot of contemplation to go to the Philippines for my 6-week internship! In the Philippines we will be helping local initiatives in the city of Bayawan. I am having a wonderfully time and learning each day. Feel free to email me if you want to know more and I will try to write back as soon as possible. Hej, This past week (October) we have been on Autumn Break providing me with more time to write. I am still doing well and have gotten good barring for my surroundings. Brazil is fast approaching, which is very exciting because it is starting to get cold here. For the courses; week four was about politics and governance. We talked about different forms of governance with a high focus on European systems. Week five's topic was Spiritual Ecology. During this week we learned about our connection with the earth, discussed global warming and indigenous people. During the Autumn break I went to a festival in Järna, helped someone move, and visited with some distinct relatives. For five days I stayed with my grandma's second cousin and his wife who live in Gothenburg. They took me around the city, to their summer home and we visited with their kids and grandkids.

New Structural Meeting

The New Structure Informational Meeting was held on 10/17/17.

Present: Bill Beardslee, Jane Waters, Bryan Terry, Sam Kelly, Peter Cram, Pasca Ferwerda, Steve Waters, Jeanne Bartlett, Hazel Vogelien, Chris Nase

Why are we restructuring? - Our by-laws required an unmanageable number of people to serve on boards and committees, there are not enough people for too many positions and this was not sustainable - too much work for too few people. The new model maximizes participation, but for less time. We need a structure to serve us, a structure that will work for us - the success of this structure will depend on our commitment. We could continue as is and we could manage for a time but we won't grow and will slowly die. We have attracted some new members and need to keep our intention of inviting people to our church to keep our church growing.

See Re-Organization Chart for more specific details on the new structure on the back page of this newsletter.

The Coordinating Council would still serve as the vehicle to communicate between the ministry areas, meet monthly, with an occasional council meeting taking place after church where everyone is invited; everyone is always invited.

The ministry area coordinators will reach out to those who expressed interest in that area - people serving in a ministry area will be encouraged to serve in one ministry at a time, working on something they are passionate about and for a limited time - if no one steps forward to serve, then we may not be able to continue with that task.

Question: Will current tasks that a certain committee now manages continue to be managed by that committee in the new structure or will they be moved? For example, would World Service continue to run the barbecue? Would WS organize the forums? Not necessarily... The Coordinating Council could discuss this and decide if the barbecue is still something we want to do and then work to get those interested to help. At Christmas time the Worship and Spiritual Life Ministry would ask for people interested in decorating the church, but that coordinator would not then do the decorating. If no one is interested in helping, then there will be no decorations.

The process is democratic - all need to be involved. Multiple events need to be supported by the whole church such as the Summer Fair and Barbecue.

A ministry coordinator can call a meeting with those who expressed interest in that area and see what ideas people have. This could be done before the annual meeting This is a good time to start discussing what we want to shift around and what we want to keep doing.

It is expected that ministry teams would meet monthly at least initially - coordinate with those who are interested - we may try to have ministry areas meet at the same time but don't know if this will be feasible.

Example: If someone is interested in starting a Coffee House, Bill would tell the member to contact different ministries for help with coordination, but that person is in charge of organizing it.

The Gifts and Skills Assessment indicated people who were willing to be ministry coordinators and those interested in serving in those ministry areas. Bill passed out the survey information to the ministry coordinators so they may contact those people and begin meeting.

Foreigners Among Us

Foreigners Among Us, Immigration in NH

In our Judeo-Christian Bible there are more than 80 references to caring for the strangers or foreigners among us. In Leviticus in the same chapter as the Ten Commandments in verses 33-34: When a foreigner lives with you in your land, don't take advantage of him. Treat the foreigner the same as the native. Love him like one of your own. Remember that you were once foreigners in Egypt. I am God, your God (The Message version of the Bible).

The immigration/refugee problems in the world today are so very tremendous. Recently Chris Nase made us aware of Indonesians in our NH Conference UCC, members of the Marantha Church in Madbury, NH, as well as other Indonesian refugees in the Dover area who were told they would be deported. These are Christians that fled Indonesia in the late 1990's because of persecution by Muslim extremists. Previously, ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) had an agreement with these unauthorized immigrants to report monthly and if no illegal activities had been committed they would be able to continue their life in NH. On August 1 the first 22 Indonesians reporting to ICE were told to come back on September 5 with airplane tickets for deportation or ICE detention. On that date I was at the Federal headquarters of ICE in Manchester to give support to these very frightened families. With other faith based communities, we had a public worship service and then did a Jericho walk seven times around the building. (For description of a Jericho Walk or March go to https://www.allaboutprayerHYPERLINK "https://www. allaboutprayer.org/jericho-march-faq.htm".) After the walk I went over to the line of Indonesians, waiting to be called by ICE, to talk with them. One family with an 8 year old girl especially touched me. Her two brothers had gone to school that day, but she was holding tight to her father's hand. Imagine the angst of a family facing detention or deportation deciding to take their children who are Americans by birth back to a hostile land, leaving them behind or seeking Sanctuary. A judge has declared a temporary stay of deportation so the next chapter is yet to be written.

There are several members of our church who are very interested in getting involve to care for these "foreigners." Bill Beardslee and I presented an informational session after church last month. There are many different ways we can help support this Solidarity Network. We will be providing more information in the coming months. One of the big things is providing sanctuary to those refugees who are ordered to be deported and choose not to go. There are many different aspects of Sanctuary. Level 1 is providing a home in our church facility for the individual/family. Level 2 is Support, Accompaniment & Advocacy: helping with things like preparing food, pressuring our political representatives to advocate with our national administration, provide legal and psychological help, provide transportation for the children (the unauthorized person is not able to leave without risk of arrest), childcare, media presence and so forth. There is now one NH United Church of Christ that has designated itself to be a Sanctuary: Meriden Congregational Church. If any of you are interested in being involved, please contact me, Bill Beardslee, or Chris Nase.

On Sunday, October 29, the NH Immigrant Solidarity Network, with leadership from the Granite State Organizing Project and many different NH faith communities are launching a special event: Prayer, Music, Poetry, Singing, Marching in Manchester that will announce to our communities the creation of this program described above. More information will be in the next newsletter. Please pray for our brothers and sisters.
