
We have met and created a new list of maintenance items which have been culled from old lists and combined with our newer projects. They have been categorized from high priority, to medium, to low.

## **Resource Ministry**

Treasurer's Thoughts by Peter Cram: It's appropriate at this time of year to reflect on last year's financial performance, and discuss the plans for the upcoming year. Much of this was discussed at the Annual Meeting, but it's worth going over again, as people have had time to digest the numbers that were presented in the Annual Report.

Last year we finished the year reasonably well financially. After all the bills were paid and after considering special fund balances that must be held in reserve, we still had a balance in our general fund of over \$4,400. That was more than I had anticipated, and it helped us with the 2018 budget, as most of that is put into the 'Previous Year Balance Forward' line item.

Budgeted expenses for the year exceeded the budget by about 5%. This was due to a couple large expenses that hit us especially hard. The problems with our heating system, that resulted in the replacement of our oil tank, sent our 'Fuel Oil and Repairs' line item to 171% of budget. Other line items in the 'Building and Grounds' area caused the group as a whole to grow to 135% of budget. With it being the largest of the Budgeted areas, it naturally had a significant overall effect. All other areas were actually below budget. I'd say we handled it well.

On the income side, we also did well last year. Some of our income categories were exceeded by the incredible generosity of our members and friends. Recall that we had a 'to be raised' figure of over \$11,000, and while we only achieved about \$4,100 of that amount, our other income more than

accommodated the deficit.

The budget for 2018 is organized differently, as it follows the new organization of the church, so is broken down by 'Ministry'. Beyond that, one of our goals with this budget was to make it a planned record of actual spending. By that, I mean to put in numbers that reflect actual spending planned. In the past, we had planned on people buying things for the church with their own cash. Also, we've had a tendency to rob some of our special funds, when the intent of the fund was not to support what would otherwise be budgeted outlays. As a result, the overall budgeted expenditures increased by over 17%.

For the 2018 budget, we do continue the practice of having a 'to be raised' line item, and it increased moderately to a bit over \$12,000. Normally I'd cringe at the thought of having that figure so high, but with our increasing membership, and the increased interest in what we're doing, both from within and outside of our membership, I'm confident we can make the numbers work.

The Annual Report has a lot of numbers in it, and while it was handed out to people well in advance of the annual meeting, the overall financial picture of the church can take a while to gel. If anyone has questions about anything financial, Pasca and I are always available to discuss them. It's your money we're dealing with, and it's important to us that everyone feel confident that the finances are being handled in the most clear, accurate and prudent ways possible. Thank you.

Refugee Solidarity, & Immigration by Barbara Luckett: I am continuing to go to the NHCUCC ministry on immigration; however, I do not sense much interest from our church on becoming more involved in the Immigrant Solidarity Network (which includes the Sanctuary movement). Besides the UCC in Meriden, there are now two other churches who have voted to become Sanctuary Churches. The immediate deportation of our Indonesian UCC Immigrants is on hold, but no one knows when that will change. I continue to attend some vigils at the Federal building in Manchester to support those immigrants who are reporting for check in at Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). These Interfaith Prayer Vigils are held on the first Thursdays of each month from 8:30 to 10 am as well.
