Five people will be taking the orientation class at the Department of corrections office in May which will prepare us for continued visits to the Women's prison.

Calls to the Deering and Weare school districts have been made to offer opportunity to students to help us produce Mother's Day Greeting cards for the women at the prison

The One Great Hour of Sharing offering yielded \$521.00 and another gift from the Guild of \$200.00 is forthcoming which will add to our Church's generous gift. Thanks to All!

Our ministry will be participating in O&A month in June as we host an informational meeting regarding Transgender issues.

It has been a task of our ministry to come up with a Vision and Mission Statement. ### Monthly Report from Norma Hubbard, Director of the Hillsboro District Food Pantry:

FYI: Here are the totals of towns and numbers of households and individuals served at the Hillsboro Food Pantry from March to April 10th. There were 6310 customers in that period. **Towns served:** 

Hillsboro: 78 households, 461 individuals, 2766 meals, 22 elderly 60 & over, 85 children 18 & under.

**Deering**: 12 households, 68 individuals, 408 meals, 5 elderly, 15 children 18 & under.

**Washington**: 1 household, 2 individuals, 12 meals served, 0 elderly, 0 children.

**Windsor**: 1 household, 3 individuals, 18 meals served, 0 elderly, 1 child.

**Allenstown**: 1 household, 10 individuals, 60 meals served, 0 elderly, 0 children.

**Antrim:** 2 households, 5 individuals, 30 meals served, 2 elderly over 60, 0 children.

### Totals of all served in all towns above for this period:

95 Households, 549 individuals, 3294 meals served, 29 elderly 60 and over, 104 children 18 and under.

## O C M: Immigration & Sanctuary In NH

Our NH area is fortunate to have three advocate groups for Immigration rights: 1) The Granite State Organizing Project (GSOP) led by Sarah Jane Knov-- 603 668-8250; 2) American Friends Service Committee led by Arnie Alpert-- 603 224-2407 and Maggie Fogarty--603988-7115; and 3) NH Conference's United Church of Christ's Immigrant and Refugee Support Group, chair Nancy Pape. The GSOP is the unifying group for the Immigrant Solidarity Network (Support, Accompaniment, Advocacy & Sanctuary). The Conference's Support Group is very active with the immigrants that are detained by ICE and in finding legal and financial support as well as host homes for immigrants. Maggie and Arnie are almost always present in all of the meetings of the above. Although I will be leaving NH, be assured that Pastor Bill Beardslee is very much up to date on what's happening in this area. Contact him if you have interest or questions.

What can you do to show support? These topics are taken by a recent email from Nancy Pape as well as from American Friends Service Committee.


**Attend Interfaith Prayer Vigils** at the Federal Building at the Norris Cotton Federal Building, 275 Chestnut Street, Manchester, when immigrants facing deportation have to check in with Immigration and Customs Enforcement. These vigils are every Tuesday from 8:30 to 10 as well as other special times. You can keep up with what's going on at their Facebook page: Interfaith Prayer Vigils for Immigrant Justice.

Communicate with your state and federal legislators. Tell them that you want both documented and undocumented immigrants to be treated humanely. Ask them to de-fund immigrant detention in the federal budget. Ask what they are doing to help immigrants.

Write Letters to the Editor calling for an end to deportations and provide a pathway to citizenship.

Get to know the immigrant community. Christine Nase has been attending various functions in the Manchester area. Let her know if you are interested in her notifying you about the activities.
