From the Pastor's Pen



Dear Deering Community Church, UCC and Friends,

Lent is the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Good Friday commemorating Jesus journey to the Cross. It is variously a time of preparation for the Easter Vigil between Good Friday


and Easter Sunrise. In the early church these 40 days culminated approximately two years of preparation to join the church in full membership. On Easter the adult seeker was baptized, confirmed and fully brought into the community through the confirmand's first Eucharist or Holy Communion. They were all one rite. There was no infant baptism for the first few hundred years of the church. Over time, largely because the concept and theology of original sin took over the life of the church, these ritual practices were individually separated out from one another. But that's a story for another time.

Lent is a time of deep reflection upon ones own spiritual state, a time of letting go of the things that distract us from a singular focus on and connection with God as the center of our heart and lives. It is a time to fast, to clean the physical-spiritual house to make room for the in-breaking mystery of new birth, of Resurrection.

We begin Lent in March. For six weeks we have the privilege of being led by Deanna Raenz, co-coordinator of Worship and Spiritual Life Ministry team, in a study of Marcus Borg's book, *Meeting Jesus Again for the First Time*. I love that title for all it implies. We meet Jesus again and again and again on this spiritual journey of ours. Each time it is a new experience, a new meeting. We change. Our perceptions and experiences change and therefore the depth and quality of relationship with God and with this extraordinary man changes.

March-April 2019

One of the things we learn about in this book is the difference between secondhand and firsthand religion. Borg writes: The way of Jesus...challenges many common forms of Christianity...In particular, it invites us to move from "secondhand religion" to firsthand religion. Secondhand religion is a way of being religious based on BELIEVING what one has heard from others. It consists in thinking that the Christian life is about believing what the bible says or what the doctrines of the church say. First-hand religion, on the other hand, consists of a RELATIONSHIP to... that reality that we call

God or the Spirit of God...The good news of Jesus' own message is that there is a way of being...that leads from a life of requirements and measuring up...to a life of relationship with God... from a life of anxiety to a life of peace and trust." (pp.87-88)



Mission: The outreach ministry incorporates the work of social action and mission in the local and global communities by proposing projects, and educating and enlisting support of our church membership. Coordinator: Chris Nase, ONA (open and affirming), and Ukama.

Outreach Ministry news for March and April 2019 from Jeanne Bartlett:

The Apostle Paul said: "Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine..." In a perfect world I imagine a place where all are safe, all are loved, all are fed. So, we are not there yet but can inch closer as we provide our gifts to further the work through One Great Hour of Sharing. The suggested date for this Lenten gathering of gifts for OGHS is **March 31.** Envision such a world where clean water is not a dream but a realty, where small farmers are paid a fair wage for their labors, where survivors of natural disasters have the resources they need, where vulnerable immigrants are welcomed in Christ's name. Can you imagine these things? Please give generously! More Than You Can Imagine..."

One member of our Outreach Ministry wrote recently in the Concord Monitor for the Mailbag column after speaking on behalf of the *Raise Up NH* along with *Rights & Democracy* at the State House, calling for an increase in New Hampshire's minimum wage. She called on us to "chat with someone who cares for the elderly. Too often they see their clients cutting Meals on Wheels lunches in half to offset the cost of medications." She calls on us to speak out, and to imagine a fairer world where it doesn't require a person to work three jobs to make ends meet.

We are providing 30 bags each month now for the Genesis drop-in youth services.

If you stay after church on the Sunday before the third Friday of each month you can join in on the packing of these bags under the leadership of Peg Hauschildt and loading them in Joyce Peace's car who makes the delivery. People working beyond the imagining.

Chris Nase is the new Outreach Ministry coordinator and we welcome her leadership and the participation of all who "seek to apply God's love and justice to those in need in our community and around the world."

Food Pantry Donations

We continue to collect alternating weekly donations of non-perishable food for the food pantries.

Hillsborough: In **March**, there is need for things like shampoo, laundry detergent, and personal care soaps. In **April**, during which there is a school vacation week, they would need meat type products such as canned ham, tuna, chicken and fish. However, during either month, you are welcomed to bring whatever food, laundry, personal care items and paper products you have to offer. There is always a need for large brown paper bags.

Weare: Donations of all types of food are needed.

Cash donations are always welcomed. Please make your checks payable to Deering Community Church and note "food pantry" on the memo line. Periodically, accumulated cash donations are divided and half is sent to each of the above food pantries.

MODERATOR'S REPORT:

I can't begin to tell you all the things that have been, are on-going or will be happening in this active and lively church. But you can see for yourselves when reading what's between these Newsletter pages! One can also look on the church webpage site and look at the calendar or events tab. I am in awe of all that this church accomplishes and yet still knows how to have fun! One thing of note, is that the congregation formally voted in the new structure of Ministries vs. committees during the Annual Meeting in January. We hope to be able to present a clear depiction of how the church now functions via a chart on the church's webpage, a model in church, and through new church brochures that will be created, with included updated church information. Peter Cram, Rev. Bill Beardslee and I will be working on refining the church's Articles and By-Laws as befitting the new model. We welcome any thoughts and input from you.

Did you know that all 'systems' (substitute church for system) have triangular formations? Such as: "Pastor, Church Ideal and Church as is". This was just one of the fascinating things Rev. Bill Beardslee introduced to us in a recent Pastor Parish Relations Ministry (PPRM) meeting. There, again, we see another triangle, "the PPRM, the congregation and the Pastor". The PPRM was learning about healthy boundaries, which are critical towards promoting a healthy system, or church. While we learned much with regards to boundaries, one thing stood out for me. The connection between "over functioning vs. under functioning" was an eye-opener. I realized I was an 'over functioning' person. The problem with over functioning (aside from being exhausting) is that we don't allow for failure, which leaves little or no room for learning or growth. Certainly, over functioning makes it much more difficult for under functioning folks to ever want to, or be able to, step up to the plate. Uh oh. We may actually be hurting the church – and ourselves- by not permitting any failures!

No worries! While we have over functioning people like me, it is evident that we also have people that are interested in stepping up and having their voices heard. With all the over functioning — and/or well functioning people carrying out various ministries, activities and tasks, it seems there are people that would like to know more or to be able to contribute in some small way. If you are one of those people, see if anything sparks an interest in the articles or reports from the 5 ministry areas, Guild and Council that are in this Newsletter. Reach out to a Ministry Coordinator or the Pastor.

This church encourages discussion and healthy communication. Ups and downs and sometimes even dancing in circles – are part of life. What is apparent, is that we are each seeking spiritual growth through Bill's sermons and actions as well as through readings and discussions – always with respect for the different thoughts, understandings or questions that pop up. We had a speaker, Genera Clay, a Deering resident, come to talk about plans to set up The Little Food Pantry in Deering, and ask for support from our membership. A motion was made to gather more info about this project and stay open to further developments; a vote resulted in an enthusiastic chorus of Yeas. We also added two new members, that day. The presence of guests, Bill Beardslee and Bryan Terry, made our meeting complete and meaningful, as well.

CHARLOTTE PRICE



Charlotte J. Price died on December 29, 2018 at the Havenwood-Heritage Heights retirement community in Concord, NH, at the age of 91. She will be remembered for her faith, love of family and her passion for bringing music and art to the community.

Charlotte Louise Jones was born on January 31 1927, and raised in Lexington, KY. Her father, Daniel J. Jones was a geologist and oil prospector who later became Kentucky State Geologist. Her mother, Matilda (nee' Gilcher) was a homemaker and amateur artist. Charlotte graduated from Henry Clay High School and from Oberlin College with a bachelors degree in music (organ).

Charlotte married Glenn Price, also of Lexington, KY, in 1950 and for 35 years they lived in Bayport, NY. There they raised four children as Glenn pursued a scientific career at the Brookhaven National Laboratory. They spent family time making music, camping, and sailing on the Great South Bay. Charlotte was active in their church, the Sayville (NY) Congregational United Church of Christ. She had a passion for childhood education, in

particular developing Sunday school and pre-school curricula.

In 1958 Charlotte and Glenn spent a sabbatical year at the Harwell Laboratory in Oxford, UK and in the late 1980s they lived in Vienna, Austria, where Glenn worked for the International Atomic Energy Agency. They delighted in hosting friends and family to share in the cultural wealth the city. In 1968, after realizing that the local community needed more artistic opportunities, Charlotte led the founding of the Bay Area Friends of the Fine Arts (BAFFA), a community arts organization dedicated to bringing classical music and fine arts to the south shore of Long Island. Charlotte was BAFFA's founding President and over the years held a number of other leadership roles. The new organization immediately embarked on an ambitious artistic agenda of concerts by its own symphony orchestra and chorus, recitals by well-known soloists, art exhibitions, readings and lectures. Through her persistence and dedication, Charlotte was also instrumental in the opening of a permanent BAFFA art gallery in Sayville, NY. 50 years after its founding, BAFFA continues to thrive in its mission to educate and inspire artists, musicians and audiences.

Charlotte and Glenn retired to an idyllic cottage overlooking Mount William Pond in Weare, NH, where they welcomed family and friends, worked on projects and indulged their love of music and nature. Into her 80s, Charlotte remained an active member of the American Guild of Organists. She and Glenn were dedicated members of the Deering Community Church in nearby Deering, NH, where Charlotte played the organ and organized classical music programs. And, after years of advocating for a better organ, Charlotte purchased a Wicks Organ Opus #2491 for the Deering church.

Charlotte Price is survived by Glenn Price, her husband of 68 years; four children: Beverly Rollins of Sunnyvale, CA; Daniel Price of Dedham, MA; David Price of Weare, NH; and Albert Price of Brooklyn, NY; and four grandchildren. The family would like to thank Dr. Patricia Clancy for her 30 years of compassionate care and wisdom, the staff and residents of Havenwood-Heritage Heights for their care and support, and the third floor nurses for their exquisitely thoughtful care in her final days. A memorial service was held on Saturday, January 26, at 2:00 pm in the Main Lodge of Havenwood Heritage Heights, 33 Christian Avenue, Concord, NH. Donations in lieu of flowers may be made to The Resident Fund at Havenwood Heritage Heights.

Additional comments made by Peter Cram about Charlotte Price include:

As you may know, Charlotte was Choir Director and Organist for the Deering Community Church for many years. She and Glenn were pillars of the church through their time with us, and were incredibly generous with their time and resources. They kept in touch after their move to Concord at Havenwood Heritage Heights, and continued to be a presence with us. Charlotte would often come back and play the organ on Sundays. Glenn and Charlotte donated the church organ we currently enjoy.

David Price said that Glenn is doing ok, but this will certainly be a heavy blow to him. As I understand it, they were married for over 68 years. Glenn is now wheelchair bound, but is receiving great care at Havenwood Heritage Heights.

The family is in the process of planning a memorial service in Deering Church for Charlotte, and at this point, the thought is that it will take place in the spring, coinciding with her internment at East Weare Cemetery. As more news comes from the family, we'll make sure that it is distributed. I should add that I called Stuart and Suzanne Huggard, who have been very close friends of theirs. It was the Prices who were instrumental in bringing the Huggards to Deering.
