Dear Deering Community Church, UCC and Friends,

Richard Rohr's new book The Universal Christ: How a Forgotten Reality Can Change Everything We See, Hope For and Believe, is a quite profound look at the Universality of Christ as a force, energy, and power that goes way beyond our

more simple understandings of Christianity and what it means to be a Christian in a world of multiple religions and Ways. He writes,

"Christ...(is) clearly not just Jesus of Nazareth but something much more immense, even cosmic in significance. How that is so, and why it matters, is the subject of this book. Once encountered, I believe this vision has the power to radically alter what we believe, how we see others and relate to them, our sense of how big God might be, and our understanding of what the Creator is doing in our world....

"What if Christ is a name for the transcendence within of every "thing" in the universe? (Transcendence = the supremacy, wholeness or divine existence)

"What if Christ is the name for the immense spaciousness of all true Love?

"What if Christ refers to an infinite horizon that pulls us from within and pulls us forward too?

"What if Christ is another name for everything---in its fullness? (pp. 3&5)

Our Advent and Lenten Study of Rohr's book is guaranteed to take us on adventure that could be mind bending and soul expanding. It could deepen our faith and commitment in news ways. Look elsewhere in this newsletter for the schedule of meetings. Books will be available for purchase soon.

What a whirlwind has been this summer and fall! It feels like this day, the strong winds whipping the remaining leaves and stripping them from the trees!

You will find in these pages the imprints and reminders of what this church is and does, from Ministry reports to chronicles from Broadway to programs that were, to programs to come. There are always too many people to name but when I think about it, it is EVERYONE in this community, even our dear friends and members who cannot always be here and live far away! STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY IS NOVEMBER 10th

The theme of this year's stewardship program is The Way as in the life of faith that is a way of being human, a way of interpreting, a way of practicing, a way of living, as in the name given to the followers of Jesus in the early church.

In his book, Free of Charge, Miroslav Volf writes that there are two irresistible false images of God that we run between and follow after:

- 1. the negotiator God who can be cruelly disappointing
- 2. the Santa Claus God who becomes our self-absorption writ large.

These images are contrary to the image of God as a purposeful and generous giver who challenges or calls us to imitate the joy and the goodness of God the Giver. It is more ecologically and theologically correct, that we are all midstream. If we are made in the image of God the Giver, we are a channel, not the catch basin of God's good gifts. We are not the final destination of the Creator's gifts.

When we allow God's gifts to flow through us, we emulate God the giver.

When we emulate God the negotiator, we move from an economy of generosity to an economy of extraction. How can we cut the best deal?

When we emulate Santa Claus, our generosity is limited. It enables insatiable desires and unaccountable behaviors because we cannot be bothered to be involved.

Again, when we allow God's gifts to flow through us we imitate God the giver. The gifts we give are not gifts that must be extracted or wrung from us as an obligation. They are gifts from God that flow through us, arising from our freedom. We participate in something larger than us. God's giving began before us and will continue long after us.

Council Ministry Reports

Mission: To represent and serve the congregation, using deliberate action, collaboration and leadership. Council members carry out the functional and ministerial working of the church to build a faith-based community of Christ love.

The Council met on July 21, 2019 and August 13, 2019. The July 21st meeting was held directly after the church service and all members were invited to stay and witness the Council meeting in action. The Faire preparation was a key area mentioned. Electricity has been added to the pavilion and at the half-way point in the year our budget is at 45%. The Safe Church Policy was explained and reviewed with all present. Copies of the policy are available at church and can be emailed as well. Please read the policy and send questions to Bill Beardslee, Chris Nase, Jess Vitkauskas or Amanda Gunter.. Information about the August 13th meeting will be included in the next newsletter. Our next meeting is September 10, 2019 at 7 p.m.

The Council met on September 10, 2019 and October 8, 2019 as well as on September 12, 2019 for a special meeting examining the Safe Church Policy.

Highlights from these meeting include –

Pastoral Parrish Relations reported that Bill welcomes people to drop in to see him when he is at church and to make sure we all inform him of congregational concerns. This ministry is also trying to ensure that Bill does not do too much. The Resource Ministry continues to work on the location of a trash shed and the purchase of a snow blower and where to store it. Peter also found a home for the Dr. Yeaple portrait. He contacted the Lakeside Presbyterian Church in Rochester, NY where Dr. Yeaple had served as a minister and they would like to have his portrait. The Guild asked about possible styles and locations for a sign signifying that Attic Treasures are open. Ministry area budgets are due November 7. Council voted to approve our church hosting the annual Hillsboro Association meeting on May 3, 2020. Our next meeting is November 12, 2019 at 7 p.m.

Guild Gleanings

Here is an excerpt: *Pretty women wonder where my secret lies/I'm not cute to suit a fashion model's size/But when I start to tell them,/ They think I'm telling lies./I say,/ It's in the reach of my arms,/ The span of my hips,/ The stride of my step,/ The curl of my lips./I'm a woman/ Phenomenally./Phenomenal woman, That's me.* And so they are, these women who meet on the first Wednesday of each month to start with lunch and member updates always remembering a birthday, or need of a healing, sending cards and good wishes. So many are included in their outreach into the community, through proceeds from Attic Treasurers open every Saturday where shoppers can find a good book, a kitchen item, a child's toy, a puzzle for a shut-in and much more. **This project is much in need of volunteer staff.** Glenice has done a great job by posting items from the shop for sale on social media.

At the business meeting, discussion about the Summer Faire ensued, expressing what went so well, along with some wise suggestions for improvement of the next one. The church refrigerator holds the surplus Vermont Grafton cheese from the faire, continuing to improve with age. It is available for sale throughout the fall.
